The general level of prices paid to farmers for their produce was 34 per cent above the pre-war level on September 15, and 1 per cent higher than August 15.

The department of agriculture in its monthly report Wednesday said that during the month farm prices for practically all crops were lowered but they offset higher prices for meat, animals, dairy and poultry products.
