Rep. Teague Approves of UMT, ERP . . .

Texas Congressmen Favoring Truman's Emergency Plan

March 19 —(P)—Texas Congressmen today were in general accord with the principles of President Truman's St. Patrick Day address before Congress. In supporting the President, the Texans said in interviews that they believed the nation should be prepared for a military standpoint.

Here are some of their comments:

SENATOR TOM CONNALLY: "The President's address was comprehensive and far-reaching. It should have profound effect on international affairs. I am in sympathy with policies proclaimed."

SENATOR W. LEE O'BANIEL: "The President has officially admitted that our bipartisan new deal foreign handling and appeasement of Stalin has brought us to the brink of war."

REP. SAM RAYBURN, Bonham: "It was a very challenging message—one that should cause every true American to think seriously about our situation and world situation."

REP. GEORGE H. MAHOX, Colorado City: "I favor implementation of our Air Force far beyond any budgetary estimates submitted. As for selective service, I don't know all the ins and outs of that problem yet and would not say what should be done."

REP. CLARK THOMPSON, Galveston: "I am thoroughly in accord with his position, and believe Congress should pass recommended legislation with all possible speed."

REP. ED GOSSETT, Wichita Falls: "We must substantially increase our military power. Our survival as a nation depends on our being so strong no enemies would dare attack us. We can't afford to be too late with too little."

REP. JOHN LYLE, Corpus Christi: "We should hasten passage of the European Recovery Plan. Some kind of legislation is needed to make the armed forces strong—whether it's universal military training or something else."

REP. OLIN TEAGUE: "I have urged all along that we remain strong to preserve our freedom. President Truman's message is good but a little late. I am for the European Recovery Program and universal military training but want to give more study to the matter of reviving the draft."

"Since the President spoke, several veterans who now are farmers have called me to say they are ready to go back into combat again, if it means their children won't have to fight."

REP. WEST: "I am in favor of the program outlined by this President. I am for universal military training, and to be prepared it looks like we will have to reinstate selective service. We cannot afford to do otherwise."

REP. WORLEY: "The only kind of language Russia understands is force. We've got to learn that the best way to have peace is to remain strong enough to enforce it."

REP. LINDLEY BECKWORTH, Gilmer: "I have always supported legislation to keep this country strong and expect to do so in the future."

REP. WINGATE LUCAS, Grapevine: "There is a question in my mind about the European Recovery Program but I am inclined to think it is a step to preserve peace. I am

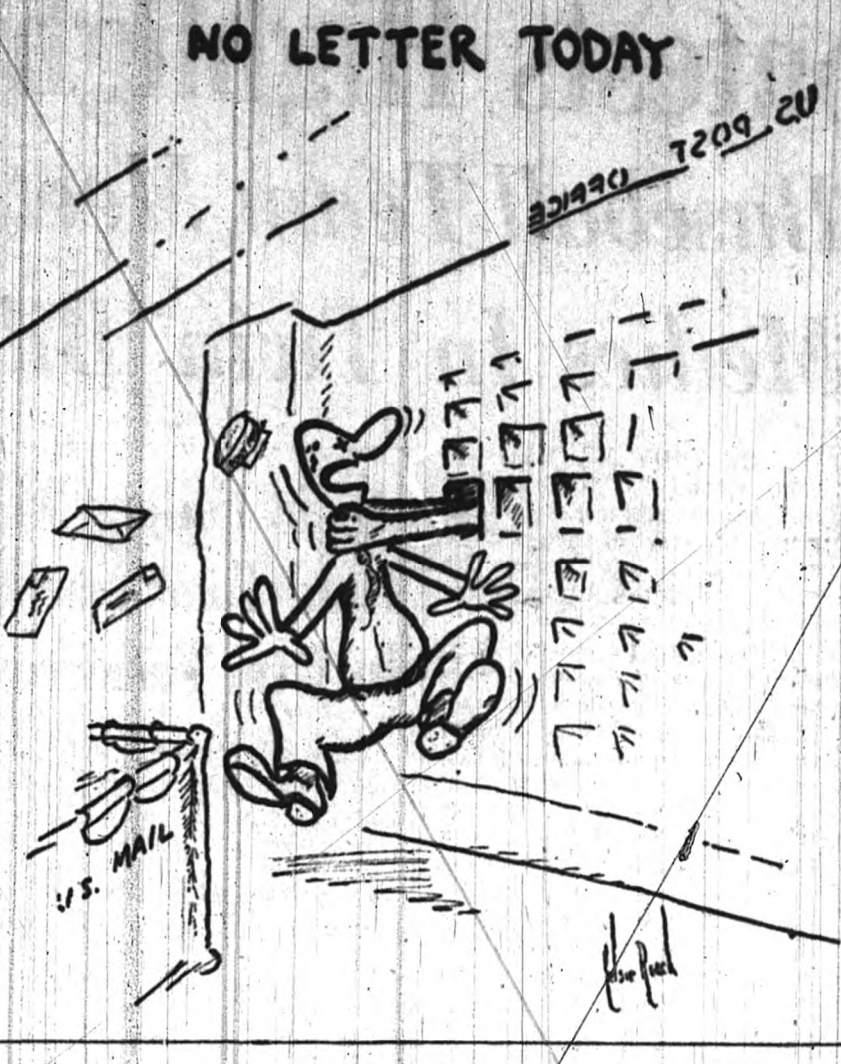
