## Wildlife Senior Represents A&M At Conference

William H. Kiel, Jr., senior majoring in wildlife management, represented A&M at the thirteenth North American Wildlife Conference held in St. Louis, Missouri last week.

The North American Wildlife Conference is attended by representatives from the 48 states, Canada, and Mexico, and is one of the most outstanding meetings of its kind. W. B. Davis, head of the department of wildlife management, said.

The purpose of the conference, according to Davis, is to coordinate and unify the efforts of the several organizations interested and participating in the conservation of our basic natural resources, including soils, waters, forests, and wildlife.

Accompanying Kiel to St. Louis, were William L. Webb and H. D. Fields, graduate students in wildlife management; James Russell Fielding, Jr., a junior majoring in wildlife management and Dr. W. B. Davis. Davis has participated actively in formulating a coordinated plan of teaching and research to be engaged in by the 13 Cooperative Wildlife Units, one of which is located at A&M.

the ace Aggie low hurdler, won the event with Don second, Ken Boren of Texas third and Bill fourth.

Bill Napier and Warren Wilson, picked up 4 points for the Aggies in the 220 yard dash. Napier was second and Wilson was fourth. The Aggies grabbed 6 1/2 points in the pole vault when Ricks and Johnny Davis tied with Walters of Texas for first place.

The Aggie sprint relay team composed of Napier, Hall, Goode and Webb Jay took second in the 400 yard relay. Jay also took third in the special 100 meter race.

For the freshmen, Robert Smith from Houston made 10 points by winning the Shot Put and the Javelin throw.

Two other victories for the Aggie Fish came when Don Mitchell won the 440 yard dash and Julian Herring won the mile run.

Although some fast times were recorded many of the tracksters complained of the slowness of the track due to the loose dirt on the surface.

Charley Parker of Texas set a new record of 9.5 seconds in winning the 100 yard dash. Parker also won the 220 with a time of 21.2.

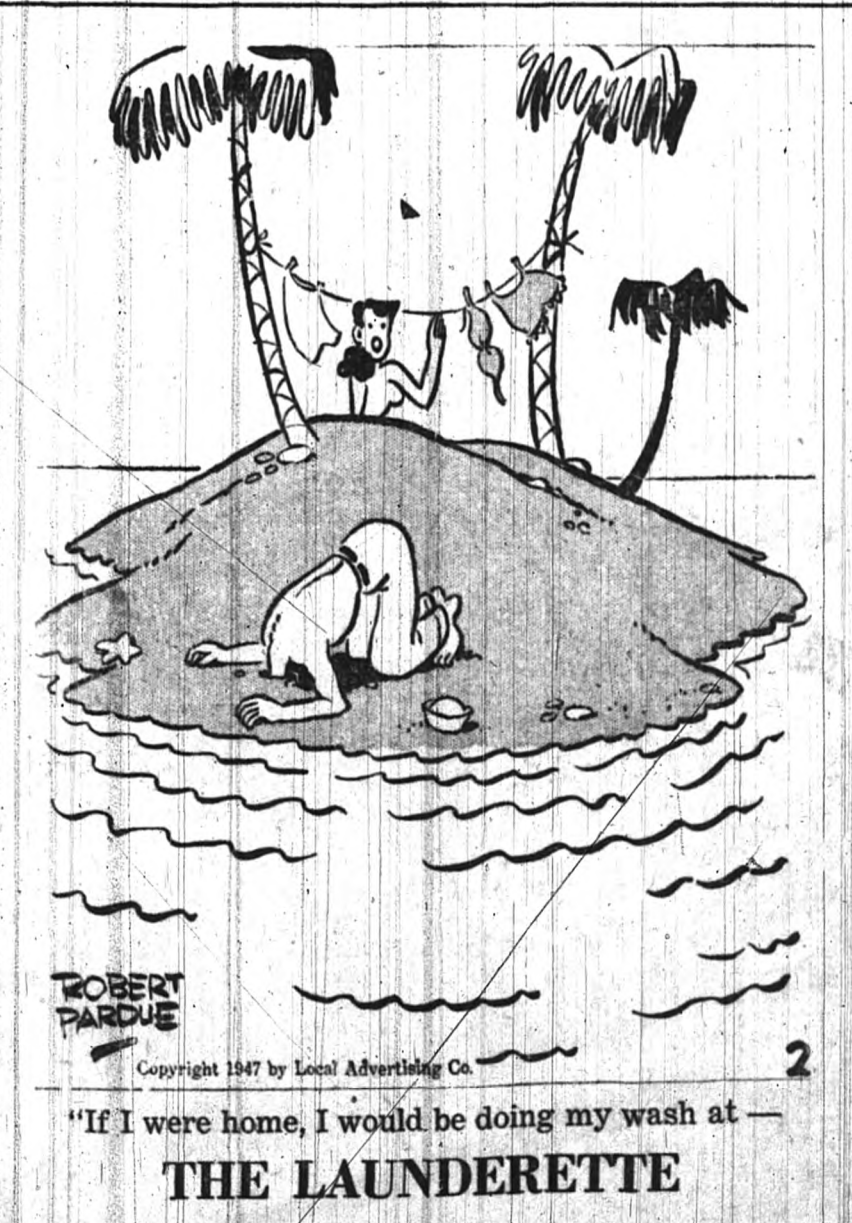
