

City Budget Laid for Year; \$2925 Passed to Committees

College Station's fiscal budget for 1950 was approved by the city Chamber of Commerce at a meeting held yesterday afternoon in the town hall.

Twelve committees received appropriations totaling to \$2,925. One of the most important contributions was made to the recreation committee, amounting to \$500.

This money will be used to facilitate recreation for the younger children of College Station throughout the summer, in the form of swimming, basketball, volleyball, baseball, and other forms of recreation, sponsored daily.

The city planning committee received \$300 to be used largely on the construction of a sidewalk from A&M Consolidated School along Jersey St. to West Park, so

that children going to and from school in rainy weather will not be forced to walk in the street.

Three hundred dollars went to the civic development committee. This money will be used to help pay for the slab to be built for colored students at Lincoln High School. The college station youth activity committee is making plans for the construction of the slab, and hope to use it later as a floor for a new gym.

The education committee was appropriated \$700, of which \$500 is to be used to buy band uniforms for the A&M Consolidated School Band. The remaining \$200 will be used for library or other educational improvements.

The public health committee was given \$100 to be used in spraying and other health protective measures.

Three hundred sixty dollars was received by the publicity committee. The larger part of which is to be used in the printing of a pamphlet advertising the business advantages of College Station. The business development committee received \$100 also to be used largely in publicity.

Other appropriations were to the agricultural committee, \$50; athletic committee, \$50; legislative committee, \$200; membership committee, \$75; a years salary of \$100 for Mrs. Neely, secretary; and \$50 for office expenses.

A balance of \$837.83 remained in the treasury from 1949, as of January 1, 1950. Additional funds, amounting to \$1,641.50, were added by commercial members and \$1,088 by industrial members. This brought the funds to \$3,387.33. After appropriations were made, \$312.33 remained in the treasury.
