# Ags Try for Comeback in Hog Game

One team picked for the conference cellar, or close to it, and another rated a dark-horse in the title race meet tomorrow night in White coliseum. The first is John Floyd's scrap-

py Aggies, who have shown flashes of being better than a cellar ball club—the second is Glen Rose's Arkansas Razorbacks.

The A&M Consolidated Tigers attempt to keep their district, as well as tourney, hopes alive tonight against Tomball in the first round of the Kiwanis club basketball tournament.

The Tomball clash will count in district 25-A standings. The Tigers have won four games and lost four over the season.

Somerville and Navasota open the tournament at 1 p.m. this afternoon.

Six contests are on today's slate. Fairfield meets Hempstead at 2:30.

Allen academy high school plays Sealy at 4, the losers of the first two games play at 6, and the winners of the first two games at 9.

Manuel Garcia leads Consolidated scorers at present with 94 points scored in eight games. Garcia has connected with 39 field

goals and 16 free throws to give him an average of 11.8 points per game. His highest output in one game was 20 points.

Norman Floeck is second in scoring with 87. He has hit 32 field goals and 23 free throws for an average of 10.9 points per game. He is tied with Garcia for the most points scored in one game with 20.

Other scorers for the Tigers include J. B. Carroll with 47, Jerry Oden, 35, Bubba Englebrecht, 33, Jon Ray Perryman, 8, and Dick Hickman, 2.

The championship contest is set for tomorrow night at 8:30 p.m., and the consolation title game at 7 p.m.
