platforms, and survey of the methods by which fresh water may be obtained from the sea.

Leipper is chairman of the marine sciences committee of the Southern Regional Education board, which cooperates with oceanography programs in schools of 14 states. He also is the 1955 president of the Texas Academy of Science.

The department head and other members of his staff have published 41 articles in technical journals of national and international scope.

Batt Photographs Win AP Contest

Two Battalion photographs have won top places in the Associated Press's 1954 Texas newspaper pho-

tography contest. One picture won second place in the feature picture division for newspapers under 50,000 circulation, and another won honorable mention in the news-features division for the same circulation class.

Both pictures were taken by Battalion Photographer Seymour Smith.

The second place picture was a shot of Military Walk taken from the top of Guion hall. The picture was taken with a Speed Graphic press camera, through Guion's anamorphic projector lens. The lens is used to widen out pictures for CinemaScope movies; Smith took the picture with the lens reversed, causing everything in the picture to be narrowed. (See picture above.)

The honorable mention news feature picture was of a group of freshmen giving the statue of Lawrence Sullivan Ross his annual spring cleaning.

The anamorphic lens picture, titled "What's Wrong With This Picture," ran in The Battalion in October, and the other, titled "Spring Cleaning," ran last spring.

The Battalion was the only college newspaper to place among the winners in the contest, which attracted more than 200 Texas newspaper photographers and more than 1,500 pictures.

The Battalion entered 10 of Smith's pictures. Smith, a senior veterinary medicine major from Sunset, La., has taken pictures for The Battalion for two years, and is now chief photographer for the staff.

"We're glad Seymour got this state-wide recognition," said Battalion Co-Editors Bob Boriskie and Harri Baker. "He deserves it."
