

Brown Lifts Ag Cindermen By Owls Face Busy Week

A clutch performance by Bob Brown in the last event of the day carried the Aggie trackmen to a narrow 70-69 edging of Rice in a weekend triangular in Baton Rouge.

Host LSU was completely outclassed by the Texas squads, mounting only 41 points.

The Aggies trailed the defending SWC champion Owls by one point going into the final event—the hop, step, and jump. The Van Vleck junior leaped 44-1½ for a first place, good enough for an A&M first place and a meet victory.

For the afternoon, the Aggies copped eight events, to Rice's six and LSU's three.

Olympian Randy Matson picked up a pair of first places for the Ags and set two records in the process. His 63-9 shot effort topped the old mark of 59-¼. In the discus he cracked the old record of 174-0 with a 188-9 heave. Former Aggie weightman Danny Roberts had owned both records.

The Cadets of Charley Thomas continued their domination of the sprints, sweeping the 100, the 220 and the sprint relay.

Quartermiler Ted Nelson returned to full time action and responded with a winning effort in the open quarter. His 49.0 performance carried him past Rice's Jimmy Ellington.

Brown was a double winner for the Ags, picking up a first in the broad jump to go with his hop, step, and jump triumph.

Two other records were set besides Matson's. Delman McNabb's 250-1 javelin throw snapped the old record by 15 feet. Bengal Leland Albright clocked a 1:52.4 in the 880 to break former A&M star Thad Crook's record of 1:54.5.

The next appearance for the A&M delegation comes Saturday in the Corpus Christi Invitational. The freshmen are competing Tuesday afternoon in a triangular in Abilene with Baylor and ACC.

Tennis Team Splits Matches Over Weekend

The A&M netmen gained a split in their weekend matches by defeating North Texas State, 5-2, Saturday in Denton.

They dropped their meeting with Oklahoma University, 4-3, Friday. The game in Norman was forced indoors by cold, 26-degree weather, but the Eagles matches were played outside in a chilly wind.

In the Sooner series Aggie victories came through the efforts of Luis Rojas and Albert Aldrich in the singles and the team of Doug Salsman and Dean Dyer in the doubles. Rojas beat Gordon Herbert 17-15 and 7-5. Aldrich bested Vance McSpadden 2-6, 6-3 and 6-4.

Salsman and Dyer beat a team composed of McSpadden and Hal McCoy 6-2, 4-6 and 6-2.

Mike Rooker of OU beat Ray Salazar 9-7 and 6-3 while McCoy took straight sets from Salsman 6-4 and 7-5. Sooner victories were rounded out by Jack Richards over Dyer in the singles 6-3, 7-9, 7-5, and Herbert and MacSpadden in the doubles. They defeated Rojas and Aldrich 6-2, 3-6 and 7-5.

In the winning effort against North Texas, the Aggies swept the doubles competition and took three of the singles sets. In the singles Aldrich took Bob Rader 6-2 and 6-1, Rojas swept by Roland Ingram 6-2 and 6-4, and Dyer beat Charles Chrane 4-6, 6-4 and 6-2.

The doubles scores were Aldrich-Rojas over Rader-Ingram 6-3 and 6-1, and Salsman-Dyer over Conner Snodgrass, 7-5, 7-5.

The Aggie record for the season now stands at 4-4.

Spring Football Workouts Will Get Underway Today

The 1965 Aggie football team will begin to take shape Tuesday with the commencement of spring training drills.

About 60 men are expected to turn out in the fenced-in area north of the tennis courts as Gene Stallings directs his first Aggie drills as head coach. Thirty will be returning varsity players.

The drills will be closed to the general public, but Aggie students and faculty will be admitted to the practices on their identification cards.

Spring training will end May 1 for the annual Maroon-White game in Kyle Field.

The Aggies lost 15 seniors off last year's squad.

One of the problem areas the Aggies are going to have to work on for next year will be the deep secondary. This has been one of the team's stronger areas with Mike Pitman and Jim Willenborg handling the chores. They both were seniors, and will not be returning.

Missing from the end positions will be John Brotherton, James Drennan and Billy Uzzell. Graduating tackles include Bobby Evans, Ray Gene Hinze, Melvin Simmons and Waylon Ward.

Absent from the guard positions will be Yancy Bounds, Ronney Moore and Jerry Pizzitola. Center Andy Overton rounds out the linemen who have used up their eligibility.

Seniors who will not be returning to backfield positions include

fullback Budgie Ford, halfbacks Tommy Meeks and Mike Pitman, and quarterback Dan McIlhany and Jim Willenborg.

Juniors returning to the end positions include Larry Bates of Houston Jones; Marvin Dawkins of Orlando, Florida; Tuffy Fletcher of Kerrville; and Rickey Whately of Port Lavaca. Sophomores vying for the same position will be Ed Breeding of Jacksboro and Lawson Howard of West.

Competing for guard spots will be juniors Tom Murrath of San Antonio-Jefferson and John Nilson of El Campo and sophomores Tom Kirchner of Port Arthur and Don Koehm of Brenham.

Returning sophomores at tackle will be Lindy Endsley of Waco; Harvey Ermis of Corpus Christi Miller; Jack Pyburn of Shreveport, Louisiana; Don West of Corpus Christi Ray; and Jim Wickerham of Houston Lamar. There are no returning juniors to tackle.

Centers will include juniors Phil Scoggin of Denison, last year's punting specialist, and Joe Wellborn of Tomball. Sophomores returning at center will be Gary Kovar of Houston Jones and Ken Lamkin of Brownwood Early.

At the halfback spots will be juniors Jerry Nichols of San Augustine and Jim Stabler of Dallas Hillcrest. Sophomore halfbacks include Ken Caffey of Thorndale; Lloyd Curington of Houston Austin; Ronnie Lindsey of Hallettsville; Mike Phillips of

Timmins, 1964-65 Aggie basketball captain, suffered a skull fracture Thursday when he was hit in the head with a baseball bat.

He was reported doing as well as could be expected under the circumstances by a hospital spokesman. The spokesman said he was being allowed only limited visitors. He said he was alert and responding to normal conversation. Timmins is expected to be allowed to return home within two or three days.

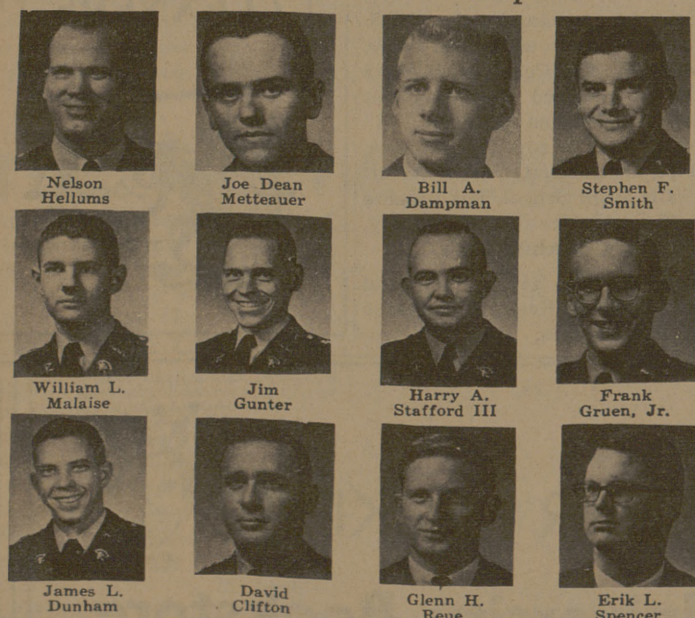
The incident occurred when Timmins called a third strike on Ewell Jackson of St. Thomas University. Jackson was the final man at bat in the ninth inning of the ball game with Blinn Junior College. Jackson represented the tying run at the plate. Blinn won 9-6.

After the call Jackson struck Timmins on the head with his bat. He was carried to St. Jude Hospital in Brenham and was then transferred to a local hospital.
