TO BE ELIGIBLE TO PURCHASE THE TEXAS A&M RING, AN UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT MUST HAVE AT LEAST ONE YEAR IN RESIDENCE, CREDIT FOR AT LEAST NINETY-TWO (92) SEMESTER HOURS AND BE IN GOOD STANDING WITH THE UNIVERSITY. A YEAR IN RESIDENCE MAY CONSIST OF THE FALL AND SPRING SEMESTERS OR ONE OF THE ABOVE AND A FULL SUMMER SESSION (BOTH THE FIRST AND SECOND TERMS). THE HOURS PASSED AT THE PRELIMINARY GRADE REPORT PERIOD IN MARCH 1976 MAY BE USED IN SATISFYING THIS NINETY-TWO (92) HOUR REQUIREMENT. STUDENTS QUALIFYING UNDER THIS REGULATION SHOULD LEAVE THEIR NAMES WITH THE RING CLERK, ROOM SEVEN, RICHARD COKE BUILDING, THIS SHOULD BE DONE PRIOR TO MARCH 10TH IN ORDER FOR ALL RECORDS TO BE CHECKED TO DETERMINE RING ELIGIBILITY. STUDENTS ALREADY HAVING NINETY-TWO (92) COMPLETED HOURS ON RECORD AS OF THE FALL SEMESTER OR 1975 MAY ORDER AT ANY TIME. THESE REGULAR ORDERS ARE MAILED THE LAST WEEK OF EACH MONTH. GRADUATE STUDENTS ARE ELIGIBLE TO ORDER WITH PROOF (RECEIPT) THAT THEY HAVE FILED FOR GRADUATION. ORDERS FOR MID-SEMESTER WILL BE TAKEN BY THE RING CLERK STARTING MARCH 22, 1976, AND WILL CONTINUE UNTIL APRIL 23, 1976. ALL RINGS MUST BE PAID FOR IN FULL WHEN THE ORDER IS PLACED. STUDENTS WHO HAVE FAILED TO LEAVE THEIR NAMES IN ADVANCE WILL BE ASKED TO RETURN LATER TO ALLOW TIME FOR RECORDS TO BE CHECKED. THE RINGS ARE DUE TO ARRIVE AT THE REGISTRAR'S OFFICE ON JUNE 29, 1976. ALL RINGS ORDERED RECORDS OF WHETHER ON MARCH 22, 1976 OR APRIL 23, 1976, WILL ARRIVE AT THE SAME TIME. THE RING CLERK IS ON DUTY FROM 8 A.M. TO 12 NOON AND 1 P.M. TO 5 P.M. OF EACH WEEK, MONDAY THROUGH FRIDAY. HOWEVER, IN ORDERS FOR RECORDS TO BE CHECKED, ORDERS MUST BE PLACED PRIOR TO 11:30 A.M. AND 4 P.M. WE HOPE THIS INFORMATION WILL BE HELPFUL AND EXTEND OUR CONGRATULATIONS.



Corps search may be illegal

Almost every room in the Corps area was searched last night after the enforced study period, says Joe Chandler, cadet colonel of the Corps.

The search was conducted by members of all the staffs — brigades, battalions, wings and groups — and without informing the company commanders ahead of time. The "staff rats" were looking for fireworks, rockets, gunpowder and other explosives banned by University regulations, Chandler said.

"The whole Corps was searched as far as I know," he said. "I don't think that W-1 (the women's outfit) was searched because we have had no complaints about fireworks being set off from Dorm 1."

"There have been more fireworks in the Corps area this semester than I've ever seen before. There have been some near accidents and some minor damage to curtains and carpets."

Chandler said a sizable amount of fireworks and gunpowder was found, but that there would be no punishment for the offenders. "It was not

my intent to convict anyone," Chandler said. "I was just trying to stop what's going on — remove the hazard before someone was hurt. Sooner or later... well, it would only have to happen once."

The commanding officers of the companies and squadrons were not informed, he said, because "we wanted to get the stuff."

Page 15 of the University Regulations says, "...no University official shall have the authority to search and/or seize the personal belongings of a student except when accompanied by a local, state, or federal law enforcement official with a proper search warrant," so the legality of staffs' search was questioned.

"Some people reacted like, 'it's my right to blow people up as long as you don't catch me,'" Chandler said. "Most people thought it was okay for us to confiscate the stuff this way as long as we didn't prosecute."

"I went straight to University officials when I first thought of the search. I went back later when I read Page 15 of the Regulations. They told

me they thought it was all right to go ahead with it."

The Texas A&M Fish Drill Team travels to New Orleans Thursday to compete in the Tulane Drill Competition and to march in the Mardi Gras Endymion Parade.

The drill team will march in the Endymion parade Saturday evening and will return on Sunday.

Nixon's statements raise controversy

PEKING — Richard Nixon today denied criticizing the Helsinki Declaration or applauding a song calling for the "liberation" of Taiwan during his visit to Peking.

"My God," he said to an aide when asked about the controversy over the toast he made at a banquet Sunday night. "I've used that statement a dozen times before and I used it in a general context. It could apply to the United Nations charter or the Shanghai Communiqué or any international document."

The statement referred to by Nixon was interpreted in some quarters as criticism of President Ford and Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger for joining the Soviet Union in the Helsinki agreement on European security and cooperation.

Nixon in his toast talked about the Shanghai Communiqué he signed four years ago with the late Premier Chou Enlai and then commented:

"There are, of course, some who believe that the mere act of signing a statement of principles or a diplomatic conference will bring instant and lasting peace. This is naive. There cannot and will not be lasting

secure peace until every nation in the world respects the security and independence of every other nation large or small."

Several State Department officials were angered by Nixon's comment, but both Kissinger and the White House said after reading the full text of the toast, they did not interpret it as a criticism.

Nixon also denied that when he applauded during a concert Monday night, he was clapping for a song calling for the ouster of the Nationalist Chinese regime from Taiwan.

"Like hell I did," he said. "I didn't really stand. It was just a gentleman-to-a-lady gesture. I stood for a lady who was standing, not for the song."

Chiang Ching, the wife of Chairman Mao Tse-tung, sat at Nixon's left during the concert and directed his attention to an English translation of one song which said:

"People of Taiwan, our own brothers, day and night, you are in our hearts. We are determined to liberate Taiwan Province and let the light of the sun shine on the island."

At the end of the song, Chiang Ching jumped to her feet applauding, and the other Chinese members

of the official party also rose and clapped.

Nixon rose partially, applauding lightly.

Nixon had his third talk Tuesday afternoon with Acting Premier Hua Kuo-feng and in the evening attended a small, informal dinner given by Hua in the Great Hall of the People.

Today, the chairman of the Revolutionary Committee of Tsinghua University, Chi Chuan, confirmed to Nixon that the man Chou En-lai

picked to be his successor, Premier Teng Hsiao-ping, is more in disgrace.

Teng was purged during the 1966-69 Cultural Revolution, rehabilitated him as part of a campaign to end the turmoil, government operations back to smooth basis and resume economic development. But after his death, Teng became the target of a critical wall-poster campaign. Hua was named acting premier.

'Moonie' critics try to get legislative support

SAN ANTONIO — Crusaders against the Unification Church of the Rev. Sun Hyung Moon say convincing legislators to oppose the cult has been a major problem.

The Rev. C. Don Baugh told the Texas Conference of Churches, TCC an ecumenical group, Tuesday that Sun Moon's followers — called "Moonies" by their critics — are skillful lobbyists.

"Unfortunately they have made political inroads," said Father Baugh, mentioning former Rep. O.C. Fisher, D-Tex., and House Speaker Carl Albert, D-Okla., as among the Moonies' congressional

contacts.

The mystical Rev. Moon said that a second savior is coming and that Christ only half finished his job of saving the world, the religious leaders were told.

An estimated 30,000 Americans believe Moon. Among charges made against Moonies are that they periodically trap their followers and exploit them.

On the TCC panel Tuesday, Tony Gunderson, a soft-middle-aged business executive whose young daughter joined Moonies while attending the University of Texas,




