OFFICIAL NOTICE TO TEXAS A&M UNIVERSITY STUDENTS

In the past, certain information has been made public by Texas A&M University as a service to students, families and other interested individuals.

Under the "Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974," the following directory information may be made public unless the student desires to withhold all or any portion of it.

Student's name, address, telephone listing, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended by the student.

Any student wishing to withhold any or all of this information should fill out, in person, the appropriate form, available to graduate students at the Graduate College and to undergraduate students at the Registrar's Office, no later than 5 p.m., Tuesday September 13, 1977.

TEXAS A&M UNIVERSITY STUDENT RECORDS POLICY

To comply with the requirements of the "Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974," Texas A&M University has adopted policies and procedures publicly periodically. These policies and procedures are intended to implement the requirements of this Act and to clarify those requirements for all members of the University student body, faculty, professional staff, parents and other interested parties. Any person desiring further clarification of this policy statement may request same from Mr. Robert A. Lacey, Registrar.

I. According to the Texas A&M Student Records System, records will be maintained in a variety of administrative offices as outlined below. The chief administrative officer in each office will be responsible for the records under his control and for the release of information in those records.

II. Student Access to Education Records

All students (and former students) of Texas A&M University have the right of access to their education records for the purpose of review, with the exception of those records prohibited by the Act (see Section III).

A. Students have the right to obtain copies of records relating to themselves at the expense of the student. The reproduction charge shall not exceed the actual cost to the University.

B. The University will respond to all requests for explanations and interpretations of records or information, provided the response is not in violation of this Act.

C. The Act provides that a student may waive his right of access to confidential letters of recommendation in the areas of admissions, job placement and receipt of awards. Students seeking employment through the University Placement Office may have signed such a waiver. Information concerning the status of such waivers may be obtained from the Director of Placement. Consent to release personally identifiable information, such as rank in class, personal conduct, grade point ratio,

SPECIAL NOTICE

In this Act as "student directory information" (this is a category of information and does not refer necessarily to a publication known as a "directory").

The information mentioned above will be released by various campus offices periodically or upon request unless the student requests in writing that specific information be withheld.

A publication known as the Texas A&M University Directory is one type of periodical containing data classified as "student directory information". It will contain the student's name, address, telephone listing, major field of study and classification unless the student requests that part or all of the data be withheld.

Periodically the Registrar will publish official notice of the above policy so that students wishing to do so can make requests known to the Registrar (undergraduates) or the Dean of the Graduate College (graduate students). After the official notice has been published, the Registrar will inform offices concerned of the requests received.

VII. Destruction of Records

Texas A&M University constantly reviews "education records" it maintains and periodically it becomes necessary to destroy certain records. In no case will the University destroy records if the action is prohibited by state and/or federal law.

Basic scholastic records are kept permanently in the Registrar's Office. Beyond these, the various departments and offices may determine their own policies regarding retention of records within existing law.

VIII. Letters of Recommendation

A. Students have the right to review confidential recommendations used in applications for employment or for admission to any educational agency or institution, or information concerning honors awarded, except when the student waives, in writing, the privileges of examination.

B. Under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, the student does not have access to confidential letters and statements of recommendation which were placed in the education records prior to January 1, 1975, if the letters or statements are used for purposes for which they were specifically intended.

IX. Former Students

These procedures apply to all persons formerly enrolled at Texas A&M University as well as to those currently enrolled.

Shah's family to leave

LUBBOCK, Texas — Members of the shah of Iran's family scheduled to leave today for a weekend reunion with the Marrakech, Morocco.

Ardeshir Zahedi, longtime advisor to the shah and the Iranian ambassador to the United States, will arrive in Lubbock today with the family, sources said.

Shah Mohammed Reza has been in Marrakech Monday, after a six-day stay in Egypt.

The shah's mother-in-law, three of his children and three of his grandchildren, Reza Pahlavi, the shah's son, will arrive in Lubbock today. The 18-year-old came to the U.S. in mid-July for a 49-week graduate pilot training program at the Air Force Academy.

Zahedi told ABC News he expected to accompany the family on a weekend flight to board an Iranian jet.

An Iranian 707 aircraft from Dover (Del.) Air Force Base landed at Reese about 4 p.m. day. Sometime later a man appeared at the prince's villa. The van's arrival rumors the entire family will depart the West Texas city.

However, departure of Farideh Diba, the shah's in-law, and Princess Farah, Princess Leila, 8, and Alireza, 12, apparently do not include Crown Prince Reza. The trainee is expected to complete 11-hour regimen at base, officials said.

During their week-and-a-half stay in Lubbock, the royal family enjoyed relative privacy in crown prince's ranch-style bedroom house in an affluent Lubbock neighborhood. A newsman and photographer kept vigil at the house most of the time, however.

Reports that the shah and Lubbock have circulated. But an Iranian Embassy spokesman said the shah's American trip has been scuttled temporarily.

Farm prices discussed at Atlanta rally

ATLANTA — Angry farmers, en route to a national test in the nation's capital for a rally Thursday to protest administration farm policies, are expected to discuss the state of the farm economy and support vehicles on Interstate 75 and were joined before nightfall at Fulton County Stadium by a group of some 130 tractor-trucks from Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas. Some state troopers and local police tractors were stretched out for miles on the highway.

Tommy Fulton of Wilcox County, Ga. said he believes there has been some success when they also demonstrate in Washington against farm policies. Farmers they are not receiving money for their crops to production costs.

"We got good results last year's tractorcade," said Fulton. "We had a great deal of impact on the peanut program... we also had price raised on cotton and in general, I think we had a tremendous amount of success last year," he said.

Van Lewis, a 50-year-old farmer from Toombs County, was in Washington last year and said farmers need to concentrate on northern congressmen to get policy concessions.

"I am not going to waste my time talking to southern congressmen," Lewis said. "We know who to stand. I'm going to talk to the ones who can help us."

The Georgia tractorcade started from Unadilla in Georgia carried such signs as "Carter," and "the only time showed any guts was when he hemorrhoids" and were decorated with American and Confederate flags.

The leaders included Kersey, head of the American Agriculture Movement in Georgia, his brother, Leighton.

Terry Mitchell of Wilcox County harged the administration was "willing to sacrifice thousands of small farmers to get out the nation and if you look at the farm situation, it is the smallest that is the most efficient."

Fulton said the farmers' full implementation of the program, giving the farmers the authority to raise the loan on commodities in storage to 100 percent.

"We feel like if we have a date under this farm bill, they could do it as let us operate it to its fullest extent," he said.
