## Pope trip journey of faith, hope

ROME — Pope John Paul II left for Latin America today on the first foreign journey of his three-month reign. He called the journey a "pilgrimage of faith."  
"The pope is going to certain areas of the New World as a messenger of the Gospel for the millions of brothers and sisters who believe in Christ," the pope told a crowd gathered at the airport before boarding his white, green and red three-engined jet.

The pope took off from Fiumicino Airport aboard a special jet of the Italian airline, Alitalia. His first stop was Santo Domingo in the Dominican Republic.  
The pope said the bishops conference will deal with "important problems...concerning the pastoral action of the people of God which in the light of the Second Vatican Council should take into account the complex local socio-political situation."

After celebrating mass with Roman Catholic bishops from the Dominican Republic, Haiti, Cuba and Puerto Rico, the pope will continue to Mexico today. There he will confront one of the most difficult problems facing the church — promoting human rights while curbing priests who side with Marxism.  
Vatican sources said the 58-year-old pope is likely to steer a cautious, middle-of-the road course when he

opens the third Latin American Episcopal Conference — in the Mexican city of Puebla this weekend.  
Because of his experience, the pope is certain to develop solutions advocated by some as the remedy to Latin American social problems.  
Sources said he also could be expected to criticize military regimes and unbridled capitalism.

## CS council approves firehouse

At the College Station City Council's first meeting in its new quarters, one councilman made "frills" in the room to illustrate objection to the cost of a new substation.  
Thursday night Councilman James Dozier called the lighting the new council room a "frill" cited it as an example for his vote on authorization for bids for a new fire substation. The bid passed.  
"I question the expenditure of money," Dozier said. "We are with all these frills that we want."  
Dozier blamed architects for high price of the fire substation which is expected to cost \$250,000. Timothy Keneipp, architect of the project, blamed the high cost on the building on the delay between the initial planning and design.  
"Dozier thinks it's my fault," Keneipp said, "but they're the who screwed up by holding me for three years."  
The council had come to a decision with the idea for the substation three years ago, but had not selected a site. According to Keneipp, an architect cannot design a building without knowing what will be.  
The new fire substation will cost about \$60 per square foot, he said, which is less than the \$80-85 per square foot cost of the Bryan substation.  
Dozier was the only councilman to vote against authorizing the bid. No date was set for opening bids.  
In other action, the council directed the fire department to begin enforcing the fire lane ordinance in the city. The ordinance states that any building more than 150 feet from a major thoroughfare must have an open lane for firetrucks.  
Before the unanimous vote, councilmen said the enforcement should be delayed in Culpepper Plaza. They said many of the owners did not know about the ordinance before they leased the space in the shopping center.  
The council agreed that the ordinance at Culpepper Plaza was bad and should be remedied.  
Plans for the consideration of HUD-subsidized housing were tabled by the council when it learned that no funds for this are available in Brazos County. The council said, however, it will try to persuade HUD to provide the funds.
