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Tube baby decision delayed

WASHINGTON — Despite some objections they were due the issue, a federal ethics advisory board Saturday delayed for at least a month a decision on whether the government should finance tube baby research.
The panelists, however, agreed to agree that fertilizing the egg in a test tube was ethical whether or not it was implanted in a woman; as long as the ultimate was to "overcome" the infertility of a married couple.
The board members, who include doctors, ethicists and lawyers, were asked by HEW Secretary Joseph Califano last year to recommend ethical grounds whether the government should lift a three-year suspension of federal support of research in which human egg and sperm are joined in the laboratory.
But after two days of public deliberations, members put off any decision pending its meeting next month.
It was clear the board was divided on the specific ethical issue before it — whether HEW should approve a request by Dr. Pierre Souqar, Vanderbilt University for \$375,000 to support a study of test tube embryos for possible abnormalities.
Rev. Richard A. McCormick, professor of Christian ethics at Georgetown University, said he was concerned with government support of research that would create embryos for experimentation and implantation.
Dr. Sissela Bok, also a board member and a medical ethics specialist from Harvard University at one point noted that the matter already divided on the board already and "it does not seem to me ought to exacerbate this split going further."

Board chairman James Gaither, an attorney from San Francisco, said after the meeting he believed the board members proved the basic ethics of test tube fertilization providing that the mate goal was to give infertile couples an opportunity to have their own children.
"I think we are much closer than what we regard as ethical," Gaither said. "I don't think our differences are great."
He said a revised draft statement would be prepared and discussed at the board's next meeting, scheduled for March.

Klansman innocent shooting?

United Press International BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — Lawyer for former Ku Klux Klansman Eugene Thomas said polygraph tests proved his client's statement that FBI informant Thomas Rowe shot and killed a rights worker in 1965 on an Alabama road.
Thomas, who served six years in a 10-year federal prison sentence for the crime, said Rowe borrowed a pistol and fired the fatal shot. Viola Liuzzo of Detroit during a five-mile-an-hour chase while she was ferrying a civil rights marcher between Montgomery and Selma.
Thomas, lawyer John Edwards Mays of Decatur and Robert Steton of Tuscaloosa, the lawyer for the United Klans of America, discussed Thomas's statements in a news conference Friday.
A signed and notarized affidavit from Thomas said he, Rowe and low Klansman William Eaton and Collier Leroy Wilkins left the Birmingham area and drove to Montgomery on their way to Selma the night of the killing. In a Montgomery parking lot, Rowe said he dropped and damaged his pistol. Collier and asked Thomas if he could borrow his gun, Thomas's affidavit said.
Thomas said they drove toward Selma, pulled up beside Liuzzo's car and saw the white woman with black youth in her car.
"Tommy Rowe said, 'Did you see that nigger and white woman? Let's get them,'" according to the affidavit.
Thomas, who was driving the car, said he assumed they intended to scare the woman and black youth.
"We chased the car at high speed and finally pulled up beside it," Rowe told the driver's side in the rear," Thomas said. "He had another window down. He fired several shots and hit Mrs. Liuzzo. Their car left the road."
Mays said he had his client's polygraph tests from three separate polygraph experts, and said all three found him to be telling the truth.
A Lowndes County grand jury in 1978 indicted Rowe for the killing, but he is fighting extradition from his home in Savannah, Ga.
Rowe Friday stuck to the story told in court to send Thomas and Wilkins to jail on a charge of violating Liuzzo's civil rights. They were acquitted on a state murder charge.
Rowe said the FBI tested his pistol after the slaying and found it to be in working condition, although it had not been fired in several days.
