With its reddish polar caps and white and yellow equatorial regions, Io is one of the most bizarre bodies in the solar system. It is surrounded by a yellow glow produced by an electrified cloud of sodium. Voyager 1 has already radioed

back hundreds of detailed photos of Jupiter and Smith said the mission so far has been one surprise after

'Happily bewildered. I think that's the best way to describe the way we feel right now," Smith said at a news conference Wednesday. "What we see is not what we ex-

pected."

The photos of Jupiter itself have been particularly puzzling. The red, orange and white clouds are far more turbulent than had been expected and seem to act more like swirling, immiscible colored liquids than

One particularly dramatic color view of Jupiter released Wednesday showed an extraordinarily complex and wavy pattern of turbulent gases around the Great Red Spot, the 'eye" of Jupiter discovered 300


South of the red spot are large oval features which had been considered the Jovian equivalent of thun-derheads. Smith said that this idea fails to explain the erratic behavior

"I think for the most part the exist-ing atmospheric models all have been shot to hell by Voyager," Smith

Other instruments aboard the big nuclear-powered spacecraft have discovered a glowing, donut-shaped cloud of electrically charged particles around the moon Io and previously unknown very low frequency natural radio transmissions from Jup-

Voyager 1 encountered Jupiter's "bow shock" Wednesday, two days later than expected. The bow shock is the region where Jupiter's immense magnetic field begins to deflect the solar wind, a stream of electrically charged particles from the sun, like the bow of a ship pushing water aside.
