## Students from Other States and Countries.

Nineteen states and nine different countries are represented in the A. and M. student body—thirty-nine cadets from other states and thirteen students from other countries or from U. S. foreign possessions.

Four men are registered from Brazil, three from Mexico, two from Peru, one from Holland, one from Germany, one from Porto Rico, and one from Panama. A cadet who recently came from Austria gives for his home address Savannah, Georgia, while a Jewish student now residing at Fort Worth came from Russia not long ago.

Of the other states represented, Louisiana heads the list with 7, Oklahoma has 6, Arkansas 4, Mississippi 3, New Jersey 3, Pennsylvania 2, New Mexico 2, California 1, Washington 1, Colorado 1, Wyoming 1, North Dakota 1, New York 1, Vermont 1, Virginia 1, North Carolina 1, Alabama 1, Georgia 1, Florida 1.
