## COLLEGE STILL ON WAR BASIS

NO NEW BUILDINGS WILL BE ASKED OF LEGISLATURE FOR NEXT BI-ENNIUM

## BUILD BUDGET NOW

Instructions Sent to Deans, Directors and Heads of Departments to Make Careful Estimates of Operating Expenses

President Bizzell has sent notice to the deans and directors of the schools and divisions of the College and the branch institutions to begin immediately on the preparation of the budgets to be submitted to the Thirty-sixth Legislature, which convenes in January. Under the plan of the preparation of the budget of A. and M. College the head of each department is expected to prepare careful estimates of the needs of his department for the next two years. These estimates are then considered by the Administrative Council of the College before finally being submitted to the Board of Directors for approval.

In the communication of Dr. Bizzell it is suggested that no estimates are desired at this time for new buildings, due to the fact that war conditions make it inadvisable to consider the erection of permanent buildings at this time. Unless the war should end within the next few months, it is not contemplated that the Legislature will be requested to provide funds for any except minor improvements and the regular maintenance of the College.

## 19-YEAR-OLDS TRANSFERRED

### MEN OF THAT AGE IN SECTION B., S.A.T.C. GO INTO REGULAR ARMY WORK TODAY

All nineteen-year-old men in Section B, S.A.T.C., or what is more popularly known as the short-course of the College, dropped their regular College work last night and today they will be taken over by Lieut. E. T. Daugherty, adjutant of the regular training detachment unit at the College, and assigned either to the radio mechanics or auto mechanics, according to their qualifications. A total of 206 men will be taken over by him at 9 o'clock today, after which they will be sent through an examination to show what their fitness for the courses offered is.

As soon as the qualifications of the men are determined they will be assigned to new companies and quartered in some of the new barracks that have just been completed. With the withdrawal of these men from the regular student body the pressure on dormitory space will be relieved and the students now quartered in the gymnasium will be able to find room in some of the regular dormitories.

## COLLEGE GIVES \$66,850 TO BONDS

RESPONSE FROM ACADEMIC DEPARTMENT EQUIVALENT TO 20 PER CENT SALARIES

## QUOTA IS EXCEEDED

This is One of Few Communities in County to go Over Top—Experiment Station and Extension Service Are Liberal

Probably the highest record attained by any state institution in Texas in subscriptions to the Fourth Liberty Loan was made by the instructors and employes of the College proper, the average being slightly in excess of 20 per cent of the annual pay roll of the institution.

The College proper with an annual pay roll of \$205,105 and an assessment in the 4th drive of \$35,000, contributed a total of \$42,100, or a little more than 20 per cent excess of the quota. The Extension Service with an annual pay roll of \$123,102 and an assessment of \$15,000, subscribed \$16,100, or a little more than 13 per cent of the annual salaries of the subscribers, and a fraction over 11 per cent in excess of the levy made by the committee in charge. The Experiment Station with an individual pay roll of \$74,670 subscribed to \$8,650 worth of bonds, or an equivalent of 11.5 per cent of the annual salaries of the subscribers.

From the University of Texas proper the subscription to the Fourth issue was approximately 12 per cent of the annual salaries, so from the College proper the response was much more liberal in proportion. From all sources here, the subscription to the recent issue was \$66,850, while the quota was only \$60,000. In other words, the College went over the top by approximately 11 per cent and was one of the few communities in Brazos county to do so.
