All expressed themselves as highly delighted with the visit, as satisfied with the working of the Institution, and as impressed with the fact that the state has no fosterchild more worthy of her support. There is little doubt that we shall hear from these gentlemen again, when they return to the Capitol.

Our twin sisters of the Artillery again boomed out a salute on Tuesday the 16th. This time three distinguished members of the upper house, Senators Wayland, Atlee, and Terrell came to turn their search-light on the workings and wants of the A. & M. College. These gentlemen left the same evening with President Ross, on special summon to Austin.

The College officials, cadets, and residents of the campus are always glad to entertain visitors who come desirous of learning the aims, operations, and progress of this Institution. And, indeed, we have no fear of adverse criticism, if we are given due credit for what has been accomplished with the limited equipment at our disposal.
