The Horticultural department
has received a request from Dr. H. P. Armsby, chairman of the station exhibit of the experiment stations for the Paris Exposition, to prepare an exhibit showing the scientific classification of varieties of the peach which was worked out here several years ago and published in Bulletin No. 39 from the experiment station. The exhibit is about ready and will be forwarded to Washington.
