PRESIDENT HARRINGTON'S SUGGESTION.

President Harrington called the corps to the chapel last week for the purpose of learning how many of the cadets would prefer living in tents to staying in the crowded rooms of the barracks. Since very few of the boys showed a preference for the tents the president decided to let the students continue as they are in the dormitories. Perhaps if the boys had thought over the matter, more of them would have embraced Mr. Harrington's proposition. We believe that if about fifty of the boys would move into the tents those boys who would be left in the rooms would do better school work. Experience teaches us that three or more boys in one room cannot do any very good work; one of them is continually shuffling about and usually has some interesting experience of the day to relate.

Another point in favor of the tents is the influence that this news of the cadets living under canvas because of the congested condition of the barracks would have upon the State legislature. This move, we think, would influence the trustees of the public funds to make an appropriation for a new A. & M. dormitory.
