## BRYAN ELECTRIC LINE.

Cars will be Running in Six Months or a Year.

A representative meeting of the stockholders of the Bryan and College trolley line was held at Carnegie Hall last night, says the *Bryan Eagle* of Saturday. R. S. Webb called the meeting to order, and W. E. Saunders was elected chairman and F. M. Law secretary. More than \$10,000.00 stock being represented in the meeting in person and by proxy, a motion prevailed that the report of the committee on the contract requirements be read, and the reading by the secretary was followed by discussion of a number of points.

While the discussion was in progress Mr. Law stated that an offer of right-of-way from Bryan to College and the required twenty acres of land for power plant, etc., has been made to the committee as a donation and free of cost. While the right-of-way has not been determined and cannot be until after the visit of the engineers to this city Monday, this offer will manifestly solve the right-of-way problem and enable the deal for building the road to be closed up without any delay on this score.

If anything was lacking to insure the successful and immediate carrying out of the trolley line project the attendance and spirit manifested in last night's meeting was sufficient to remove all doubt that Bryan means business and will have the road within twelve months from the date the contract is signed.

Mr. Kennedy, says *The Eagle* of Friday, expects to begin grading by November 15, and to receive tie shipments in January. If rails can be secured from a Texas road, as he hopes to do, he says the road can be built in six months; otherwise probably a year will be required. The grading, it is estimated will require about four months. He has placed orders for two cars of a capacity of fifty passengers each and one trailer.

Mr. Kennedy says the Milwaukee capitalists whom he has interested in the enterprise anticipate a considerable appreciation of the stock in the next two years. While in no sense, unduly enthusiastic, Mr. Kennedy is entirely confident of the successful outcome of the project, and his talk indicated that he is fully backed in this opinion by those whose money is behind him.
