My horses and mules, of which there are ten head, are doing well. The place is well improved. Besides six rent houses, I have a nice two-story building to live in." Mr. Caldwell asks that he be remembered to the present juniors, who were Freshmen when he was here.

Miss Kidd "captivated her audiences" in London, especially in her interpretation and rendition of Italian music. Her voice is a high soprano.

Dallas News: The directors of the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College met in called session yesterday morning at the Oriental Hotel, giving consideration to the report which will be sent to the legislature, naming W. W. Evans of Coleman as superintendent of the college farm, succeeding W. R. Robinson, who resigned last summer, and granting right of way through the college campus to a company which proposes to construct an electric line from Bryan to College Station.

Several special appropriations of large amounts will be asked of the Legislature by the directors, who declare that the appropriations will be necessary in order to properly conduct the work of the college. An appropriation of \$52,000 will be asked for the erection of a dormitory capable of accommodating 125 students. At present twenty-four boys are domiciled in tents, and were money available for the purchase of more tents it is said other students would camp in order to relieve the congestion in the barracks.

For an engineering building \$75,000 will be requested. Three leading departments are to be accommodated—civil, electrical and architectural engineering.

There will be requested \$4,000 for a farm equipment building, so that instruction may be given in the use and care of farm machinery.

For a steam heating plant \$40,000 is requested. This plant is to furnish

heat for all buildings except the mess hall.

The college is said to stand much in need of fine dairy and beef cattle, as well as fine sheep.

As the best individuals of the choicest strains are desired at the college, to obtain even a few of these will necessitate a heavy expenditure, demonstrating, Prof. H. H. Harrington, president of the college, states, that education in technical and industrial science is much more expensive than education along literary or ordinary professional lines.

The following directors were present: Capt. F. A. Reichardt, Houston; Judge K. K. Legett, Abilene; L. D. Ansler, Nempstead; Capt. A. J. Brown, Dallas; H. H. Harrington, College Station.

The appropriations requested for maintenance are expected to be this year somewhat larger than usual.

FIFTEEN FATALITIES.

That Number of Deaths From Swamp Fever in Six Days.

Shawnee, Okla., Jan. 15.—A peculiar disease, commonly called swamp fever, caused fifteen deaths in the Sacred Heart district in the south part of the county in six days.

Five members of one family were buried in one day.

COLLIDES WITH FREIGHT.

Engineer Queen and Baggage-men Hart Lose Their Lives.

Kansas City, Jan. 15.—A Rock Island passenger train collided with a freight train seven miles north of Parkerville, Mo. Engineer M. Queen and Baggage-man Charles Hart were killed.

Ancient Tomb Discovered.

Cairo, Egypt, Jan. 15.—Theodore Davis, an American explorer, discovered at Luxor the tomb of Queen Tety, wife of Amen Hotep III. The tomb contains mummy coffins, Coptic jars and numerous interesting objects. It is expected the inscriptions will throw the link hitherto missing in ancient Egyptian history.

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
