Y. M. C. A.

An interesting meeting of the Y. M. C. A. was held in the chapel Sunday evening, immediately after supper. The meeting opened with a song, Mr. Bean presiding as leader. The subject set forth was, "The Primary Purpose of the A. & M. Y. M. C. A. A few verses, found in Ezekiel 33, 1-9, were read, after which reading the leader brought forth several good points bearing on the subject.

Mr. Cornell read a well prepared paper on the subject of Personality. He gave several instances of the power of personality or personal magnetism. In his concluding sentences he suggested several ways by which Y. M. C. A. men may use personality in influencing their fellow man along uplifting paths.

After a short prayer, led by Mr. Ellis, a talk on Fellowship was given by Mr. Weinert. He showed how the Y. M. C. A. promotes good fellowship among the men. He also showed conclusively the value of such fellowship to men in after-life.

The latter part of the meeting was devoted to business. Dr. Powell was elected General Secretary of the A. & M. Y. M. C. A. The addition of this officer makes A. & M. the second Texas college to have a General Secretary. The office places the college among the leading schools of the state in Y. M. C. A. matters. Dr. Powell pointed to the good the association had done for the college and pointed further to the fact that a general secretary would place the college in touch with the leading schools of the United States in Christian lines of work.

Finding it more convenient, the Y. M. C. A. has decided to hold its regular meetings on Sunday nights, immediately after supper, instead of Sunday evenings, as heretofore, in order to have enough time for the meeting. A committee of three was appointed to see President Harrington about having study call sounded thirty minutes later on Sunday nights. The association is fortunate in getting the president's co-operation with them in their work. He granted the committee's request gladly. It is hoped that as this arrangement does not inconvenience anyone in the matter of time, everybody will attend the meetings.
