### Y. M. C. A. HAS A SUCCESSFUL MEETING.

What the Association Has Accomplished in the Last Few Weeks.

Last Sunday night immediately after supper the Y. M. C. A. met in the College chapel for the purpose of holding its second devotional meeting in the history of the organization and of the college.

This meeting was led by one of the members of the association. Inspiring speeches were delivered by three of the members, and prayers and songs ascended in honor of Him who is the sovereign of all. Everyone present entered heartily into the spirit of the meeting and much good will surely result from such good work.

The association numbers over 140 men and has a paid College Secretary. It is also raising \$100.00 to help pay the salary of the General Secretary for the College Y. M. C. A.'s of the State. The association is now without a doubt upon a solid foundation, and all it needs is a little time, and things will be booming at A. and M.

There is no reason in the world why A. and M. shouldn't have a Y. M. C. A. building; and if the present abnormal growth of the Y. M. C. A. continues it must and will have a building within two years at most. The present Sophomores and Freshmen will no doubt enjoy the privileges and pleasures of an excellent association building.

Full 80 per cent. of the cadets now present are from Christian homes, and the majority of these have already cast their lot with the Y. M. C. A. And more evidence still. About 250 men are doing Bible study work in the barracks in classes. Every Sunday the classes meet, about ten or twelve in some fellow cadet's room, and they read and discuss two chapters of the New Testament. The Book of Mark has just been finished and the classes will now enter upon a study of the Acts of the Apostles.
