## CINCINNATI REDS

Cross Bats With the Agricultural and Mechanical College Team.

## LEAGUERS ARE IN FINE TRIM

Agricultural and Mechanical College Team Holds Them Down to Nine Runs. The College Got to Third but was Unable to Score.

Before the largest crowd ever gathered at the athletic field, the Cincinnati Reds of the National League showed the difference between the finished product and baseball material in the making. The score, however, was not excessive being 9 to 0, all earned in the third inning when our boys went to pieces. With the exception of this innings the college boys put up a, rather good game—plenty good enough to lay it over any other college team in the state.

The Cincinnati Reds acted most gentlemanly and we regret that some of the boys cast personal remarks at some of the visitors. They took all good-naturedly and their back talk added much to the fun of the day. Ganzell would take the cake from a clown, while Huggins' new yell—Hippity-Hop—called forth round after round of applause. College yells will never faze any professional, all they can do is to brace up the home team. Let's have more of them.

Ganzell and Kokley tied with two hits; Mowrey, Huggins, Hueweiler and Smith rapped off one apiece. Several singles but no two-baggers grace the score card. The Reds are great base runners and owe some of their runs to their speed.

Kelley got in front of a line drive from Mowrey's stick. He and Ehlinger coupled up for a neat double in the fourth that put Ganzell and Lobert on the shelf. Hueweiler did good stick work but his fielding was not what it should have been. Black stopped some warm ones and Crockett pulled down a high fly in deep left. Smith was not in his usual form but still got strike outs on the heavy hitters. Dabney showed up well in his first game and has the making of a heady twirler wrapped up in that big slow moving form of his. He went in the box the last of the sixth, Smith going to center in Moore's place. A. and M. is very fortunate this year in her pitching staff.

The game by innings:

### FIRST INNING—

First half: Kelley walks. Moore's bunt lost and he's thrown out at 1st. Wessendorf flies out to Mowrey at short. Kelley out on second on a try for a steal.

Second half: Huggins struck out. Davis follows and Lobert is thrown out at first.

### SECOND INNING—

Milligan up, takes two fouls and Huggins hugs an easy fly. Black and Ehlinger strike out.

Ganzell gets first on a hit through third and short. Goes to second on Cruger's sacrifice but is thrown out while taking a rest. Mitchell strikes out. Smith "blayed the blame" this inning.

### THIRD—

Mowrey takes Crockett's fly. Hue gets a hit and steals second. Kelley

Schlei makes first, stole second, scores on Kokley's hit to left field. McLean strikes out.

### FOURTH—

Wess, robbed of hit but makes first. Milligan knocks a pop-up which was dropped and Dutch was thrown out at second. Black fanned. Ehlinger fast one to Mowrey was prettily fielded. Ehlinger out at first. Milligan stole second and Crockett out at the plate. Davis out at number one. Lobert gets base on being hit by Smith. Ganzell and Lobert go out on a fast double by Ehlinger and Kelley.

### FIFTH—

Hewiler out to Cruger in left. Kelley fails to make second and Moore strikes out. Cruger out on a short one fielded by Wess. Mitchell drops one on the line and is thrown out at first. Mowrey gives Black a hot one, thrown out at first.

### SIXTH—

Mason goes in the box and McLean takes Schlei's place behind the plate. Smith up easy fly to second. Wess lines one to center, out. Milligan rolls one to third and goes to second on error. Black fans. Dabney goes in the box and smuth to center. McLean drives one to Kelley who throws him out at first. Mason strikes out. Mowrey hits a line drive to Kelley. Side out.
