A. AND M. DID SOME GOOD PLAYING IN SPITE OF COLD.

### SECOND GAME NOT PLAYED

On Account of Bad Weather—Good Prospects for Victories on Trip.

It was a cold day for T. C. U. and the spectators last Friday, but our team warmed to their task and easily run up the forfeit score in six innings. Never have our boys showed such team work and this was largely the cause of T. C. U.'s string of naughts. A. and M. got four errors, none costly, while the boys from Waco rolled up ten.

Tyson did the twirling for the visitors. He has a wonderful delivery but the cold weather must have interfered with his control. His team gave him poor support, but never laid down, even when we were running in over them in the second and third.

Capt. Smith pitched the first two innings and then went to left field while Huff went in the box. Even though it was cold, both pitched their usual winning ball. T. C. U. got four scattered little hits that amounted to nothing. In the third Black robbed Tyson of what would ordinarily be a safe one by a pretty bit of fielding and a throw to Huff at first.

With such playing on the trip we can see nothing but a continuous round of victories. T. C. U. started off the game by filling up the bases, but Smith pitched out of the hole and never again did it look like a score for the Wacoites. A strike out and a double put an end to the first round. A. and M. took it easy the first spasm but how they worked during the second spasm! T. C. U. got three men to bat and then our boys opened up.

Wessendorf took first on balls, went to third on Hueweiler's hit, and scored on an error by Bloor. Black made first, stole second and scored on a couple of errors, coming in close behind Pewee who scored on an error by the shortstop. Ehlinger got first on an error by Tyson but was killed at third. Huff was switched in and assisted Black and Pewee across. Kelley clouted the sphere over the centerfielder's head. That was good for two and he made third on the throw to the plate that didn't cut Huff off. Kelley scored on Moore's roller and Bloor's error, and Moore went down in a goose chase between first and second in which all of the T. C. U. team took part. Smith walked. A couple of errors landed him on third. Milligan worked around to second and Dutch struck out. Leaving the score 5-0.

The third was less interesting. T. C. U. was retired in short order style. Black and Huff got the first man up; and a strike out, and a caught fly by Moore finished the job. A. and M. got "only" three scores. Smith was robbed of a hit

by Perkins who was working on Choc at second. Hueweiler, Black and Ehlinger (by Hornsby) did the scoring. Black made a long slide on the way in.

T. C. U. got a hit in the fourth by Bloor. Hueweiler handled a hot one that would have made home look easy for Bloor. A double by Ehlinger and Dutch closely followed by Ehlinger's taking a pop-up back of first brought our team to the bat. Wess walked and Hueweiler drove one too fast for Perkins to handle clean and went to first. Black knocked up one to Thomas who easily converted it into a double. This with Milligan's out was sufficient.

Tyson took three and the bench. Frizzell put it safe in left field but it was no use; Ehlinger and Kelley were on their jobs and took in two pretty fouls.

The only thing noticeable in the next round was Kelley's come home from second on a wind up by Tyson and Bloor's error. Moore got hit in the head but didn't get his base as Ehlinger did just before.

The next was the last one on account of the cold and the darkness. Milligan and Black got hits and Pewee walked, but none of these were turned into scores. T. C. U. tried to change the score by changing the batters but it was too late. Carnes gave Kelley a chance to do some pretty picking. Randall made first and went to second on a wild throw. Perkins went out at second and Frizzell ended our slaughter of the innocents by taking three swings.

Our boys did the playing and we regret they didn't have a chance to win the next game from Randall, which was not played on account of the inclement weather.
