The track meet of the S. W. I A. A. at Waco was something of a disappointment, owing to the small number of competing colleges. Austin College, Fort Worth University, Missouri School of Mines, and Trinity had no entries. Washington University and the University of Oklahoma had entered teams and were expected up to the hour of holding the meet but failed to put in an appearance.

The track was very slow and this, with the lack of spirited competition, kept the race from coming up to the usual standard. The most creditable showing was made in the field events. The ground was very unsatisfactory for jumping and vaulting, the pole vault going at the low mark of 9 ft. 7 in.

Texas with ten men took 78 points, A. and M. with three men took 25, Baylor with ten entries won 19 points and T. C. U. with eleven men secured 2 points. Three new records were made. In the running high jump Bone of Texas cleared the bar in beautiful form at 5 ft. 91/2 in., defeating his team mate, Kenkall, who held the old record at 5 ft. 7. Ross added eleven inches to the record for the shot put, and Spivey lengthened the discus record by four or five feet.

A. and M. took all three places in the shot put, the only clean sweep made. In addition to this she took first and third in the discus, first in the hammer, second in the running broad jump and third Christian University 2 points. in the too yard dash and the pole vault. Of the six even we failed to secure a place in but one, the running high jump. The century was a beautiful contest, Ramsdell leading Hendrickson by about six inches, with Hamilton less than two feet behind.
