Alumni Association Working for Separation from the State University.

In the meeting of the Alumni Assotering this college. President F. W. McGinnis, of Terrell, presided, C. A. Live, of Beaumont, making his ad-

Col. E. B. Cushing, of Houston, offered the resolution relative to the plans of the association, which was

"Whereas, the constitution of the state of Texas declares the A. & M. College to be a branch of the University of Texas; and,

"Whereas, investigation indicates that such section was adopted to enable the A. & M. College to receive its support, in part at least, from the munificent dedication of the people's domain for the creation and support of the said university; and,

"Whereas, the A. & M. College has never received its fair share of the said university funds, and for years it has received practically nothing;

Whereas, the field or on, plan of operation and purposes of the A. & M. College are essentially and materially different from those of the University of Texas; and,

"Whereas, the democratic platform takes cognizance of the necessity of a separate and independent existence for the A. & M. College; therefore

"Resolved, by the alumni and exstudents of the A. & M. College, That the attention of the governor-elect be called to the existing condition and to the necessity for repeal of the clause of the constitution above referred to and that he be urged to embrace in his message to the legislature the recommendation, together with a further amendment providing for the permanent maintenance of the college, be submitted to the people. and that the legislature be urged to submit such amendments to the vote
