COLLEGIATE.

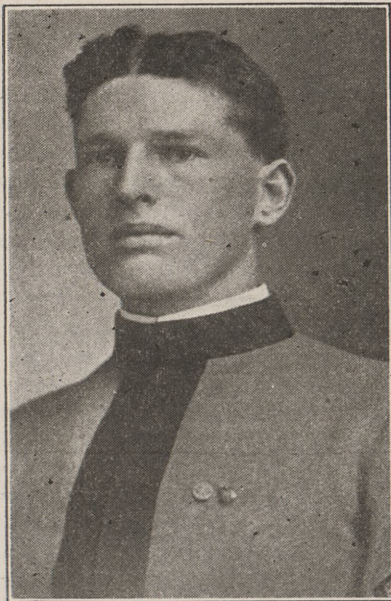
There are forty colleges in the United States whose heads are Yale graduates.

The University of Chicago recently conferred degrees on 125 students "at a sitting."

Among the 5000 students at the University of Pennsylvania every state in the Union is represented.

Michigan leads in the number of its alumni in Congress—twenty-seven. Harvard is second with sixteen. Yale and Virginia are tied for third place.

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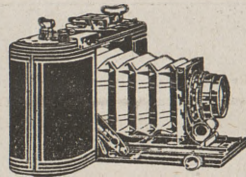
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
