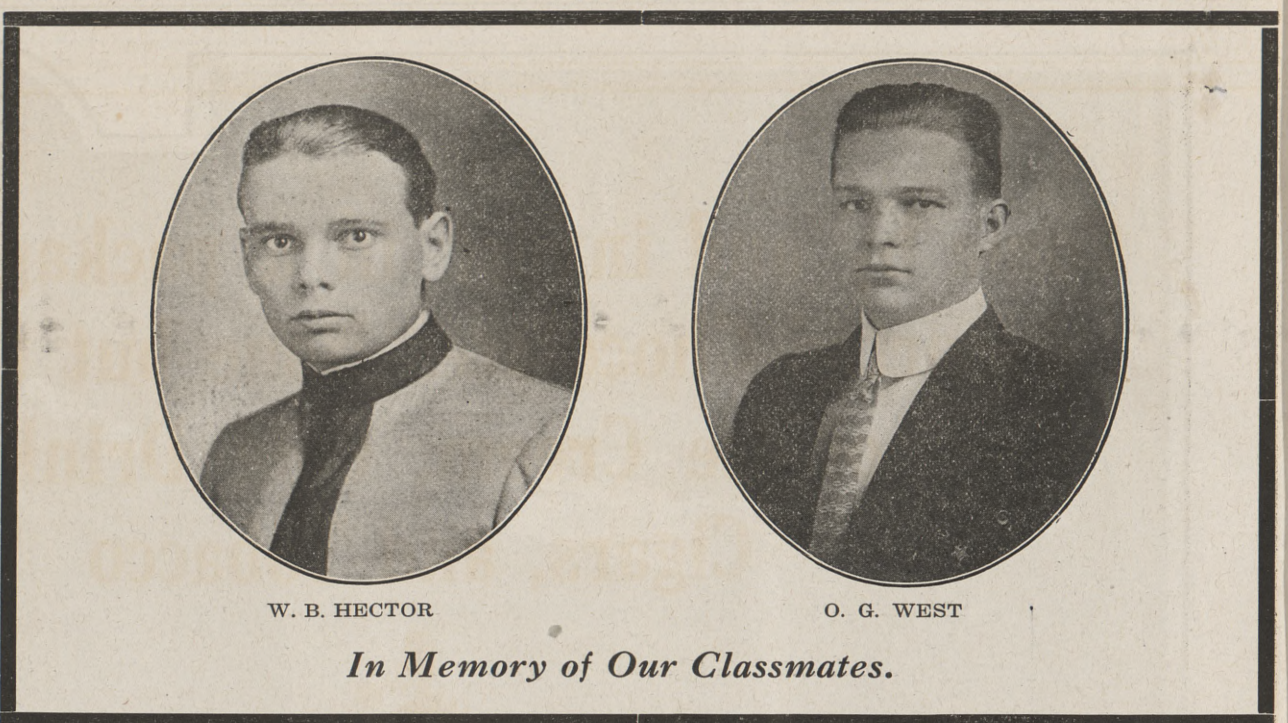
One by one the different speakers were called upon to give their toasts.
