

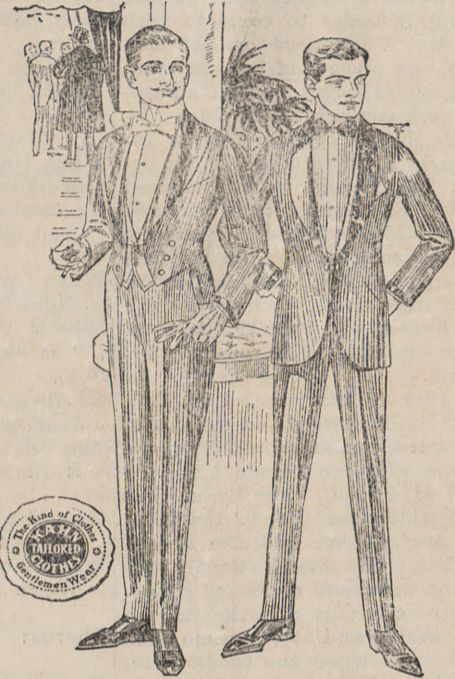

Christmas without their diplomas, will be enabled to graduate in April.

In the event of the failure of this move, practically every Senior in this college who is of age will leave in January. Three fourths of the class is subject to draft, and most of this number will be called for examination when the next increment is called for. This will mean that either they will enter the training camp at Waco or be conscripted. In either event they would fail to graduate. As a result, there is much anxiety over the outcome of the attempt by the college presidents to get the men exempted until April.

MAY NOT MAKE WACO AND HOUSTON TRIPS.

Persistent rumors, which cannot either be confirmed or denied, are floating round the campus to the effect that the railroads will not undertake to carry the cadet corps to Waco and Houston.
