Transferred to command and organize the 71st Field Artillery at West Point, Kentucky, September 1, 1918. Regiment demobilized February 2, 1919. Detailed to A. and M. College of Texas in charge of the F. A., R. O. T. C. unit February 10, 1919, arrived at A. and M. College, February 17, 1919.

#### FARMERS DEFEATED ON TRACK BY NARROW MARGIN

University Stars too Much for the Aggie Track Team.

Despite the fact that the A. and M. track team presented a much better balanced aggregation than did their rivals, they were beaten by the work of one or two star men of the University squad. The trick was turned by three of the Orange and White, namely, Gray, Brown and Moss; this trio accounting for 46 of their teams 63 points. All three men put up remarkable performances and the Aggies are willing to admit that there has never been seen a more wonderful exhibition of individual ability than that shown at Kyle Field last Friday.

But the Longhorns were not alone in the field of stars, for several Aggies pressed them close. The performance of Weir in winning both the 100 and 220 yd dashes brought back to the old men the remembrance of the days not so long past when Merlin Mitchell used to show them all the back of his neck. Hugon ran a pretty quarter and was not even pressed at the final while Alexander, Neuman and Ehlert made a clean sweep of the weight events.

The Farmers led in the score up until the very last of the meet when the losing of both places in the 2 mile run and the loss of the relay gave their opponents a 9 point victory. The next meet will be at Dallas, May 10, at which all Conference Schools will be represented.
