Following is a draft of the Blanket Tax as endorsed by the representatives of Student Activities and the ratification of which is de-sired by the student body:

Be it enacted by the students of the Agricultural and Mechanical Col-lege of Texas: Section 1.

a. Each student shall, upon ma-triculation before the Christmas hol-idays, shall pay a Students' Activity Fee (Blanket Tax) of thirteen dol-lars and fifty cents (\$13.50).

b. Each new student who matricu-lates any time after the Christmas Holidays shall pay a Students' Ac-tivity Fee (Blanket Tax) of eight dollars and twenty five cents (\$8.25).

c. The following may have the privilege of paying any apportion-ment of the fee that the payer may

desire: (1) Faculty members of the Ag-ricultural and Mechanical College of Texas.

(2) Employes of the College, Ag-ricultural Experiment Station, and of the Extension Service.

(3) Citizens of Bryan, Texas.
