

activity concerned shall determine the amount to be paid.

Section 2.

a. The fee of thirteen dollars and fifty cents (\$13.50) shall be apportioned as follows:

- The Athletic Council 68.5%
- The Longhorn 22.2% And
- The Battalion 9.3%

b. The fee of eight dollars and twenty-five cents (\$8.25) shall be apportioned as follows:

- The Athletic Council 55.8%
- The Longhorn 36.4% And
- The Battalion 7.8%

Section 3.

a. With the advice and consent of ALL beneficiaries of this fee, the Faculty Committee on Student Activities shall have authority to lower the amount of the fee, if conditions should justify such action.

b. With the advice and consent of ALL beneficiaries of this fee, the Faculty Committee on Student Activities shall have the authority to change the apportionment of this fee, if conditions should justify such action.

c. The power of raising the amount of the fee is vested in the student body. Such a change can be made by a majority vote of the students, fifty per cent (50%) of the students in school shall constitute a quorum.

Section 4.

a. Upon written order of the President of the College, the Fiscal Department is authorized to refund to each member of the editorial staffs of the Longhorn and the Battalion, to each distributor of the Battalion, to each man making a letter in any form of athletics, and to each man representing this College on any inter-collegiate athletic squad, the proportional part of the tax paid by him for the benefit of the student activity he is associated with. Athletic squads for any team are limited to twice the number of men that is required for a single team.

Section 5.

The accounts of all beneficiaries of this fee must be handled by the Fiscal Department of the College.
