

BOXING AND WRESTLING SQUADS ORGANIZED

Friday afternoon the boxing and wrestling classes for this season were formally organized and work will go on every day from now until the close of the season. The class work and instruction will be given on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from four until 6 p. m., but practice and workouts will take place every day.

The wrestlers have been working out for some time already and are fairly well represented in all events. About thirty men are working out daily and now that the gym has been released by the basketball team sufficient mat space will be available for the whole of the squad. The wrestlers are very fortunate in having as coach this year L. G. Jones who made his letter three years at Princeton University and knows the game thoroughly. He is a finished wrestler and knows the sport from A to Z and there is no doubt that A. and M. will finish high up in the college wrestling world this year.

About thirty men have signed for boxing—most of them being beginners. The coaching of this team will be in charge of Athletic Director Driver who had charge of the boxing three years ago—the only time A. and M. has taken part in this sport. Williamson who was a member of this team won his letter at Cornell this year in boxing. Only one old man is out at the present time, Mahan captain of next year's football team, but the class as a whole will no doubt give a good account of itself ere the end of the season.
