STUDENTS HAVE OPPORTUNITY TO JOIN BRYAN COUNTRY CLUB

Realizing that quite a number of the students of the college would be glad to enjoy the privileges afforded at The Bryan Country Club during their stay at the college, the Board of Directors have voted to extend to them an opportunity to become ASSOCIATE MEMBERS of the club.

The associate membership can be taken out any day of the month but must be for six months from date. Each applicant must be recommended by a member of the club in good standing. Dues are payable six months in advance without any initiation fee or any other charge except ten per cent of the dues as war tax.

Practically all of the staff of instruction of the college are members of the club and application blanks may be secured from Charles A. Felker, Dr. J. O. Morgan or Walter W. Kraft, all members of the Board of directors living at college or from Travis B. Bryan, treasurer of the club, at the First National Bank in Bryan.

Peacefully standing and chewing her cud,

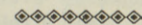
As I rubbed her ears; that Jersey cow.
