By far the greater loss from the fire was from the dam age done to the laboratory equipment which has been an accumulation of a number of years, much of that ost being very expensive and difficult to obtain.

A thorough investigation of origin of the fire is being made by the college authorities but so far no satsfactory explanation of the cause has been found.

President Bizzell stated yesterday hat from all information brought out in the investigation the fire could not be charged to carlessness or negligence of anyone and said the most probable explanation was that SENIOR CLASS OFt originated from a defective wire or faulty insulation.

He has asked the state fire marshall to cooperate with him in determining the cause of the fire and rep resentatives of the department are now at college for the purpose of making an investigation.

The new building that has been planned by E. J. Fermier, professor of Mechanical Engineering will cost M. C. A. chapel the seniors elected \$100,000 and one that is adequate to house the laboratory equipment necessary for the best instruction could not be constructed for less money. However no money is available at present and no appropriation has been asked for that purpose.

About twelve specialists reported at the armory and were taken out to the new rifle range in an army truck. Rapid firing and the two-mill tap were practiced on the machine gun. The single shot and automatic firing from the prone and standing positions were gone through with the automatic rifle. Much enthusiasm was shown by the cadets over the remarkable exhibitions put up by each arm. This was the first time on the range with these guns and the specialists were made to realize the power and efficiency of their pets. The accuracy and speed of these Browning pups were remarkable. 
