asked to keep this in mind and be lenient with the department if these activities do not begin to function as rapidly as they have expected.

"Fish" drill will be handled jointly by the Department of Military Science and the Department of Physical Education. This change is being made in order that the entire physical training program of "Fish Drill," Intramural Activities, and Intercollegiate Athletics may become unified and thus each phase and function to the advantage of the other. In this way when a freshman has shown a certain amount of proficiency in "Fish Drill" as determined by certain tests he will then be excused to engage in the intramural activity of his choice.

The first semester will not be marked by any sweeping changes but with the completion of the Gymnasium the students may look forward to a program which it is hoped will justify their expectancy and also give a fair indication of what is in store for them in the future.
