FORENSIC CLUB PREPARES FOR INDUSTRIOUS YEAR

The small but select organization which had the honor last spring of defeating the debate team of the Oklahoma Agricultural and Mechanical College has begun its year's work with the determination to make extemporaneous speaking and intercollegiate debate more important activities on the A. and M. campus. The present membership will be increased by the addition of a number of students whose applications are now pending.

The aims of the Forensic Club and its standards of membership and work are indicated by certain provisions of the club constitution as

amended last spring. The aims of the club and the conditions of membership are stated as follows on the same application blank

"The Forensic Club exists for the purpose of giving its members practice in parliamentary procedure and extemporaneous speaking, and of encouraging intercollegiate forensic. Though it is hoped that the sessions of the club will be enjoyable, sociability will be incidental to serious work. The constitution therefore provides that a member may be suspended for continued absences from the weekly meetings, or for neglect of duty, and may be restored to membership only upon written petition accompanied by a reinstatement fee.

"Any sophomore, junior, or senior student who has the requisite ability and resolution may be elected a mem-

ber by two-thirds vote, upon completion of the above application, which must lie on the table one week before being voted upon.

"The annual dues of \$1.50, payable in advance, are the same whether a member is admitted at the beginning or near the end of the college session."

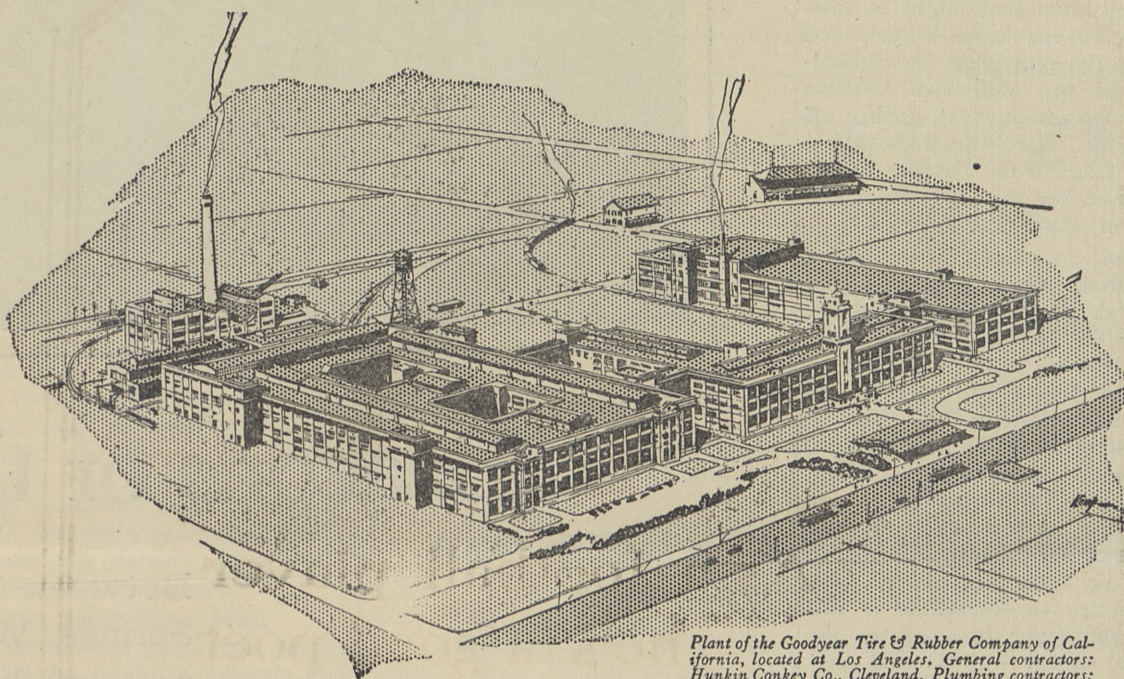

The main thing is, just up and do it.



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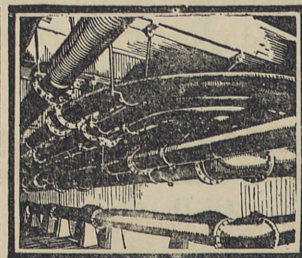
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
