the other Tiger backs, were outstanding in the Sewanee offensive and both performed brilliantly. Gooch at right end and Helvey at tackle, turned in splendid games, the latter having been shifted from full to tackle to help meet the weight of the Farmer line.

For the Aggies, the stars were many, Fay Wilson was the man who sent the long spirals far into the territory of the purple warriors. Mit Dansby was perhaps the outstanding player of the backfield on both the offensive and defensive. His passes, by means of which the Aggies made their touchdown, were accurate and traveled with meteoric speed, and his work on the defense was sensational. Litric Bob Berry ran the team well and his 55-yard run during the final period was one of the sensational plays of the game. Kishi played his halfback position to a perfection, but his best work was on the defensive where he started.

Coach Rothgeb's line stood the test of the first big game to a perfection. At the wing position, Allison showed the Southwest that he was the best. Time and again the Tigers would launch an end run around his end only to have the giant Aggie wingman break it up. At tackle, Waugh tied with Allison in showing what an All-Southwestern man could do. Bones Irwin in turn, tried to outdo the brilliant Waugh. When the last named entered the game, Sewanee attempted several plays over his tackle only to find that there was 200 and some odd pounds of brawn and fight in the way. Norman Dansby at guard, was perhaps the most consistent player in the line; playing his usual brilliant game and at times his work bordered on the sensational. The improvement in the playing of Forgason and Ochterbeck was plainly

evident, and from the progress they have shown in the past week, they will be dealing their opposing guards on some of these Conference teams, misery by the bushel. This is especially true of Forgason. He has had some trouble getting into condition up to the present time on account of a bad ankle, but just watch him from no won out. At the pivot position, Brazleton's playing was wonderful. His passing was perfect; in addition to that, he was a determining factor on the defense. Besides backing up the line, he stepped back on two different occasions and broke up two of Sewanee's passes; intercepting one and grounding the other.

At the other end position, both Beutel and W. Wilson played good ball. Wilson was at the receiving end of one of the passes that made possible the touchdown.

The principal weakness of the Aggie eleven was the inability of the secondary defense to break up the passes attempted by the Tigers. However, it is a safe bet that they won't be weak in this phase of the game when they meet the strong Arkansas Aggie team on Kyle Field Friday, because they certainly had plenty of practice in this art in Dallas last Saturday.
