**WARRANT OFFICER R. J. DUNN  
 BUILDS UP A. AND M. BAND**

The A. and M. Cadet Band has always been noted for its size and quality of music produced. This year the band is not only much larger than it was last year, but also better in other ways.

Warrant Officer R. J. Dunn is largely responsible for the very favorable impression the band is making wherever it is heard. Bandmaster Dunn is a newcomer at College. For thirteen years he was director of an army band at Fort Benjamin Harrison in Indiana. In 1918 he took a bandmaster's examination at Paris, France, in competition with 205 other men. 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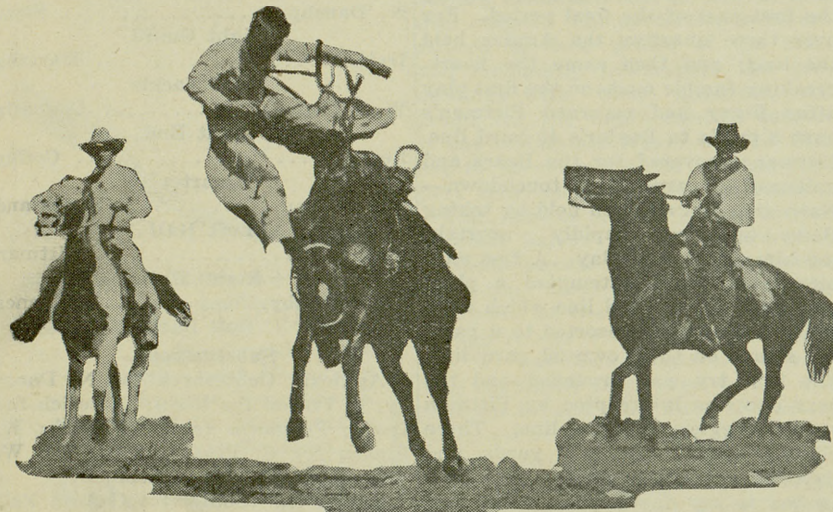
