

WINNER OF CHEMISTRY CONTEST IS ANNOUNCED

Banquet Given to the Twenty-Five Contestants Who Competed for Prize. H. P. Wylie of Dallas Is Winner.

The winner of the annual chemistry contest of the Freshman class was announced last Thursday evening at the banquet in Sbis Hall Annex. This chemistry contest was started three years ago by the Department of Chemistry and Chemical Engineering for the purpose of stimulating interest among the Freshmen by adding a spirit of competition to the work. H. P. Wylie of Dallas, Freshman chemical engineering student, won the contest this year.

The representatives of each Freshman chemistry section who were in the final contest were at the banquet Thursday night, and their own teachers, the head of the department, and the deans of the College were present. After the dinner the winner was made known, and Dr. C. C. Hedges, head of the Department of Chemistry and Chemical Engineering, presented him a valuable handbook. Professor M. K. Thornton, who conducted the final examination of the contest, announced the winner, after making his decision just before the banquet started. Short talks were made to the students by Professor H. R. Brayton, who supervised the competition, and by Deans Charles Puryear, Charles E. Friley, E. J. Kyle, and C. H. Winkler.

The contest is held every spring and is compulsory for all freshman chemistry students. The test which determines the winner covers the work of the entire school year. It includes chemical names, formulas, equations, and problems. The preliminary test is given to each section, and the winner in the section then competes in the final contest.
