## TEAMS PICKED FOR RELAY MEETS

Aggie Will Compete at Austin Friday and Houston Saturday.

A. and M. will enter three teams in the Texas Relays at Austin Friday. There is a possibility of the fourth team entering if an improvement is made in the time intervening.

The one-mile team will be composed of Parker, Burgess, Blair and O'Neal. The sprint team for the quarter and the half-mile events will be made up of Wooldridge, Buck, Burgess, and Utay.

The teams will leave Austin for Houston where they will also take part in the Rice Carnival. In addition to the men picked for the relay teams, Coach Anderson will enter several men in the individual events at both places in the track meets following the relays.

This will be the season's real opening and we will get our first chance to compare the strength of our team with others of this conference as well as out of state entrants.

Schools having teams entering the relays besides those of the Texas Universities and Colleges include Michigan State University, University of Missouri, Haskell Indians, Notre Dame, Oklahoma A. and M., Grinnell College, University of Iowa and other leading Universities over the country.

The feature event of the Texas Relays will be the long endurance race of the Tarahumari Indians of Mexico from San Antonio to Austin. Three women of the same tribe will start on the same highway and run the full marathon of 26 miles. The finish of both events will be sometime in the afternoon of the Carnival.

The Waco Cubs of the Texas League journeyed into our midst last Friday and Saturday for a pair of games, but the best they could do was to lose the first game 4-3, and win the second 1-0. Both games were fast and well played.

Hillin went the full route for the Aggies in the first game and held the visitors to three runs and six hits, Aggie misplays giving the Cubs two of their runs. Waco scored first in the 4th inning but the Aggies came back and scored two on Baker's double and Tucker's home run. Tucker's hard hit ball went for the circuit when it bounced over Kelly's head in left field.

Nig Schuenemann with two hits and two walks was the batting star of the day. Baker and Tucker also gathered two hits apiece. The winning run came in the ninth inning when Schuenemann singled scoring Tucker from second base.

The second game was not decided until the ninth inning when Shires of the Cubs hit one to left field scoring Vigare from second. Shires was out at the plate attempting to stretch the hit into a home run.

Sikes pitched the first six innings for the Aggies and held the Cubs hitless. Wyman relieved him and gave up three hits in three innings, two of them being bunched in the ninth for the winning run. Caldwell pitched a fine game for the Cubs, holding the Aggies for two hits and no runs.
