RUSSIAN COSSA **CONCERT HERE**

To Be Biggest Attraction in Assembly Hall This Year.

A new company making its first tour in the United States is the Russian Cossack Chorus, under the direction of Sergei Socoloff, and being sponsored by the Southwestern Musical Bureau at Dallas. It is composed of fourteen Russian Cossacks, and is dated to appear in the Assembly Hall on November 14th.
