## COLLEGE PLANS FOR FIFTH COURSE IN HIGHWAY ENGINEERING

The Fifth Annual Short Course in Highway Engineering will be held at this institution under the direction of the Civil Engineering Department and with the cooperation of the State Highway Dept. on March 27, 28 and 29. The purpose of the course offered is to bring together engineers, contractors, officials and others who are interested in the street and highway problems of Texas, in order that they may not only hear various phases of these problems discussed by experts of State and National reputation, but also that they may have an opportunity to meet with each other and exchange ideas.

The speakers have been chosen with the idea of securing the best available talent for the discussion of the various subjects. Included in the best are members of Research Staffs, College Faculties, engineers from the State Highway Department, County Engineers and contractors, as well as prominent men in allied work. An interesting figure will be Miss Myra W. Leeson from Dallas, first woman to attend a Highway short course and who has already registered. According to Mr. J. T. L. McNew Professor of Highway Engineering who is in charge of arrangements there have already been 160 applications for registration and an attendance of
