Recognition of the educational accomplishments of Dr. Charles Puryear, dean of the College and of the Graduate School and head of the Department of Mathematics, was given when honors of Phi Beta Kappa, national educational honory fraternity, were conferred upon him at a meeting of the Beta chapter of Texas at Rice Institute held for that purpose in Houston last week.

Dean Puryear, who has long been connected with A. and M. in various capacities, having once been acting president of the college, received his master of arts degree from Richmond college in 1881, a degree in civil engineering from Virginia in 1885 and a doctor of literature degree from Daniel Baker in 1914.
