The personnel of the teams which are to represent the College in the matches has not been picked yet. However, three teams have been entered in the Hearst Trophy Matches this year. In addition to the usual trophy, a trip to Washington, D. C., will be given to the winning team in this match. There will be two teams entered in the 8th Corps Area matches.

Cadet Major J. J. Janak, of Weimar, is captain of the varsity team this year and will issue a call for candidates just as soon as it is possible to use the range. Lieutenant L. R. Nachman (Inf. D.O.L.) is coaching the team and urges that the team be supported.

"Every man in the Corps is urged to get behind this team and put A. & M. College on top this year's list of rifle teams. If you can shoot, turn out for the team," he said.

Peter: What does that mean?

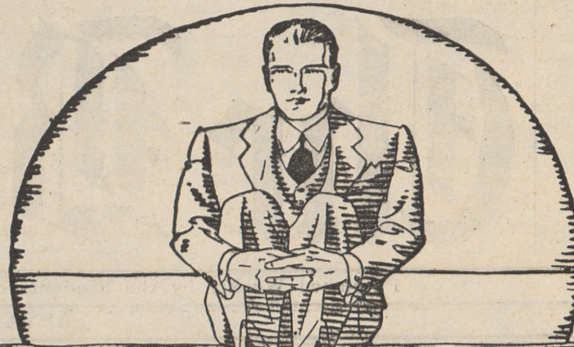
Moses: Ask Carnegie. He knows.
