Red Oliver re-cently beat the famous Tolan to the finish line. Aggieland boasts three of the stars in Harlan, conference champion hurdler and one of the five fastest hurdlers in the United States; Floyd, Conference javelin record holder and fourth best in the United States last year; and Bob Farmer who leaps 23 feet and 10 in-Westerfelt, Texas quarter-milches. er ranks as the outstanding quartermiler of the country and Hammon of S. M. U. has become a serious contender in the javelin throw, throwing he shaft some 202 feet in a recent meet

Although the Aggies have been defeated only once this year, the Longhorns are onsidered the outstanding contenders for the Aggies' crown, with the Aggies second, Rice third, and T. C. U. fourth. However, Coach Anderson is expected to shift Rufus Emmons from the dashes to the 440yard relay team and the 440-yard run, although he clipped a tenth of a second off the 220-yard record and ran the 100 in 9.8 in the triangle meet last Friday. Rice and T. C. U. will take most of the points in the dashes anyway and extra points in the 440 and relays may swing the title back to the Aggies for the second consecutive time.


