## Profs. Spend Summer In Colleges

The teaching staff of the school of arts and sciences has been enlarged by the admission of several new members for the 1931-32 session. New faculty members are: M. V. McDougall, M. A. (Rice), Ph. D. (Johns Hopkins), Assistant Prof. of Economics; James L. Glanville, M. A. (Southern Methodist), Ph. D. (Johns Hopkins), Associate Prof. of History; Nat Edmonson, Jr., M. A. (Austin College), Ph. D. (Rice), Associate Prof. of Mathematics; Harper G. Brown, M. A. (Tulane), Instructor in English; and Raymond O. Berry, B. S. (North Texas State Teachers College), Acting Instructor in Biology.

Walter Lee Porter, Prof. of Mathematics, has been appointed Acting Head of the Department of Mathematics, filling the place made vacant by Dean Charles Puryear whose illness prevents his active direction of the department. Mr. Porter received the degree of Bachelor of Arts from Howard College in 1911, and the degree of Master of Science from the A & M College of Texas in 1926. He is

now a candidate for the degree of Philosophy from Rice Institute. Mr. Porter has been a member of the Department of Mathematics since 1918.
