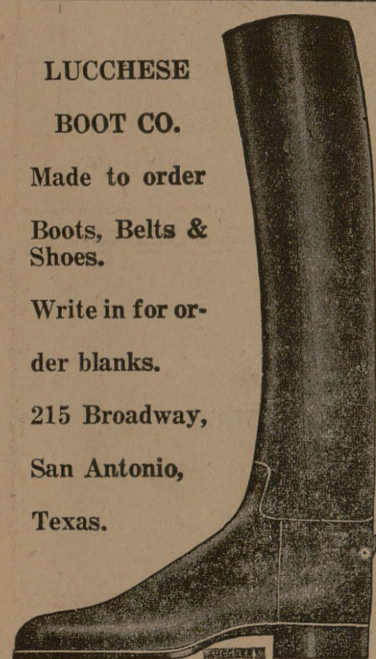

I will endeavor to find words and phrases which justify the work of our chief and capable, nay, most capable and efficient yell leader, Jay U. (Two Pistol) Parker.

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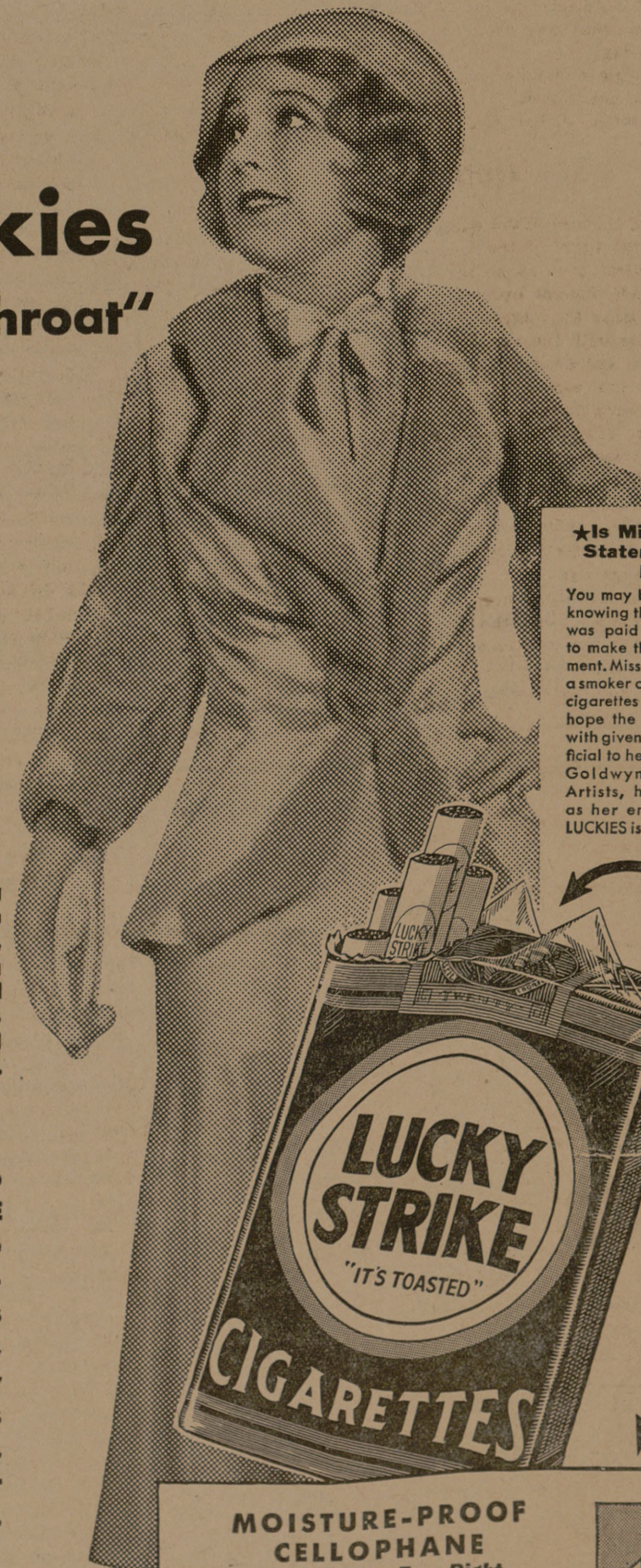
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
