

Excellent guarding and poor goal shooting by both teams resulted in a 14 to 9 win for Coach John Reid's downtrodden Aggie cage men over their age-old rivals, the Texas Longhorns, on the Memorial gymnasium court Saturday night as the curtain was brought down on the 1932 basketball race, thus ending a rather lean season for both teams.

While the low scores indicate the closeness of the guarding, the totals might still have been higher had a few of the numerous shots, missed by both, been good. From the very start the game resolved itself into a defensive battle with neither team able to consistently make their tosses count for scores, and the net result was a total of only eight field goals being counted for by the two teams, six by the Aggies and one in each period for the Steers.

Joe Moody, forward who took high point honors with four field goals and a pair of free throws for a total of ten. "Bull" Elkins with a sum of four points led the vanquished Longhorn five in scoring. Captain Charlie Beard further distinguished himself as one of the

leading conference guards by some splendid floor work.
