Direction by Sidney Sutherland, and the excellent playing of Tracy, Cooper and Boyd, make this the outstanding comedy of the air, as well as a real thriller. **Varsity Wins Over Fish In Fast Meet With Heavy Margin**

**Strong Fish Team Not Well Represented In Practice Meet**

Showing of unusual strength in the dashes and a discouraging weakness in the mile prevailed Saturday afternoon when the varsity track team overwhelmed the fish team by a lop-sided score of 71-17. The varsity took nine out of ten first places. Scheduled to be a competition meet between the two teams it turned out to be only a practice workout for the varsity when several of the outstanding freshman stars took advantage of the week end and went home, while others were working out for spring football.

**Fish Not Represented**  
The supposedly strong freshman team was not well represented in any of the events. There was no competition in the weights.

A fast track and a strong wind enabled G. J. Kohler, Palestine; numeralman to run the 100 and 220 yard dashes in 9.9 and 22.0 seconds respectively. W. B. Hoosier of Milford, freshman, was timed at 10 seconds flat in the century and also closely followed Kohler in the 220.

Competition in the mile showed a very pronounced weakness in the varsity entrants. C. D. Long, Roscop numeralman, ran a poor second to F. O. Cook, Lampasas, freshman. H. Fuentes, cross-country man, was forced to drop out because of a recent stay in the hospital.

T. W. Akins, Ft. Worth, and George Lord, Jourdanton, both showed to advantage in the quarter-mile; Akins finishing in 51.3 against a strong wind.

George McVey, Parsons, Kansas exhibited a little more strength than was expected by finishing first in both the high and low hurdles.
