day. On one of the tries for the extra point the ball sailed between the uprights and fell in the midst of a group of school kids. A sharp tussle resulted with each trying to get the ball. When one was finally successful in his efforts, he declined to throw it back across the fence to the waiting official, who finally had to request the help of a gentleman who was sitting with the hero-lovers.

Ray Murray's performance at end was a highlight at Saturday's game. A Domingue-Murray pass combination was good for three different 30-yard gains—the first of which put the ball in scoring position for the first Aggie touchdown. One of the few Aggie cadets in the stands heard the remark from a Vanderbilt man who was scouting the game, for the Commodores, that Murray's performance was the best he had seen in a long time. Indications are that Charlie Malone will not be able to play this year on account of his knee injury, but will probably be back next year to make the Malone-Murray combination the best in the Southwest.

Evidently the Tulane team had orders to watch the Aggies flying Frenchman for every time he carried the ball, three or four men managed to snow him under, and he got few chances to repeat his last year's tactics. "Goat" Hewitt perhaps furnished the biggest thrill of the game with his dashing 45-yard run that directly accounted for the second Aggie marker late in the last quarter.

In his first major football game, Jack Stringfellow, fast sophomore quarterback, showed his heels to the entire Tulane team in a very convincing manner. Jack was one of the fastest members of Coach Anderson's undefeated freshman relay team last spring, and will probably be on the Varsity relay team next spring.

Centenary's convincing 13-6 win over the Texas Longhorns and the S. M. U. Mustang's 6-0 defeat at the hands of Texas Tech gave the conference its first upset of the season. T. C. U.'s wild stampede over the Daniel Baker Hillbillies was expected—but a score of 55-0 was not looked for when the Longhorns could roll up only 26 points in their tilt with the Hillbillies. Texas was given the best chance to win the conference gonfalon in a poll of votes made recently by sport writers throughout the state. Opinion was divided on the Rice-L.S.U. fray, but now the Feathered Tribe appear to be the most powerful of the many title contenders of the conference.

The conference spot light will undoubtedly be turned toward Dallas this week-end where the Owls and Mustangs meet. Dope seems to point toward the defending champions being defeated by Rice for the first time in many years. Baylor journeys to the Pelican state to battle Loyola. The Bear's victory over the Saints from St. Edwards University in Waco last Saturday did not give a very good insight on the strength of the Bruins because the Saints are not reputed to be very powerful. The Louisiana team marked up its first victory last Friday in New Orleans in beating Alabama Southern University 12-0.

Texas journeys to Missouri to battle the same Missouri U. that they crushed last year 31-0 in Austin, but this year the Tigers have a new coach, a new team, and are playing in their own back yard. Northwestern defeated the boys from the "show me" state last Saturday, but only after the All-American Pug Rentner and several other outstanding players were sent in the game. Missouri played them on even terms during most of the fray.
